OTTAWA, June 26-F. D. Monk, Minister Public Works leaves at the end of week on a tour of inspection of Public Works from Montreal up the St. Lawrence and on the Great Lakes.

OTTAWA, June 25-Right Hon. R. L. Borden, prime minister, today accepted an invitation from the local Conservative association to be the guest of honor at a great banquet and demonstration planned to be given in his honor on his return from England.

OTTAWA, June 26-President J. H. Plummer of the Dominion Steel Corporation was in Ottawa today interviewing the Minister of Railways regarding the new line from Springhill to Wallaceburg.

HALIFAX, June 26-The tragedy enacted at the home of H. Kenneth Lee, near Port William in yesterday's morning, came to a climax yesterday when Mr. Lee succumbed to his wounds and passed away.

LONDON, Eng., June 26-A White Paper has been issued by the Admiralty comparing the position of the naval strength of the leading Powers with regard to battleships the Powers now stand as follows:
