REACHED HALIFAX AFTER TWO MONTHS FROM CH'TOWN

HALIFAX, February 16.—After two months battling with storms and ice floes, the double topsail schooner Robin, of Quebec, owned and sailed by Captain J. Levesque, of Bathurst, arrived yesterday from Charlottetown. She is a strange rig to be seen in this harbor. The captain and crew were glad to make haven of refuge after their hazardous voyage of 60 days from P. E. I. port. She is bound to Boston with a cargo of 5,600 bushels of potatoes and before continuing on her voyage will require a new foresail, jib and a general tuning up in her running gear. The Robin came to Halifax in tow of the tug P. W. Roebing, Captain Chas. Mood. The tug brought her from Whitehead, from which place Captain Levesque wired to Halifax for a tug and the Roebing was sent down. The Robin has two yards on her foremast and some of the followers of the sea would have yesterday that the Robin was a brigantine, but Captain Levesque told the reporter that his vessel was known on the St. Lawrence as a double topsail. She is lying at the Plant Line wharf.

ANOTHER WAR LOAN FOR CANADA

OTTAWA, February 17.—The third domestic war loan will be floated next month. The amount and terms of the loan will not be finally settled until immediately before the issue is made. It is probable, however, that it will be practically along the same lines as the two preceding issues, namely, for one hundred millions, netting a little better than five per cent. interest. Conditions as to the amount and interest rate will depend on prevailing conditions next month.

The Minister of Finance has been assured by the bank representatives and by the leading bond dealers and brokers of Canada, that they will give the same willing co-operation which helped to make the two last loans so successful. In view of the exchange situation between the United States and Canada which is at present adverse to Canada, it is understood that the securities of the new loan will be made payable both in Canada and in New York.

RUSSIA SPENDING 100,000,000 ROUBLES ON MERCHANT FLEET

LONDON, Feb. 20.—A despatch to Reuter's Telegram Company from Petrograd, says the Russian minister of commerce has introduced in the Duma a bill, under the terms of which the government will devote 100,000,000 roubles toward the creation of a Russian mercantile fleet.
