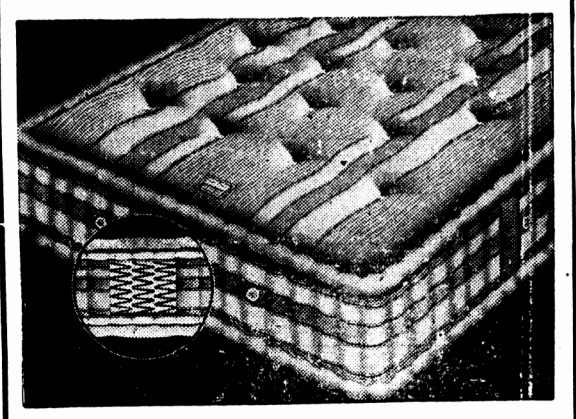
To Cut Electric Power In Southern Ontario

(By The Canadian Press) TORONTO, Sept. 17 - Supplies of hydro-electric power to Southern Ontario municipalities are to be cut by 7,000,000 kilowatt-hours a day. The first reduction of 3 1/2 per cent will be made next week. The following week there will be another 3 1/2 per cent cut, boosting the total slash to 7,000,000 kilowatts. Chairman Robert H.
