SATURDAY'S MEETING.—The meeting Saturday of the Delegates to the Farmers Institutes to receive the reports re a suitable building for Seed Fair and other Agricultural Business was well attended. The committee recommended that the Government be asked to purchase for this purpose the Town Building (Market Building) which has been offered to them for \$8,500. The meeting passed a resolution unanimously adopting the committee's report and a committee consisting of the Rev. Father Gauthier, Dr. A. A. McLeelan, H. T. Holman, Wm. McGregor and Fulton Simpson were appointed to wait upon the Government and present to them the report of this meeting.—J.

TOWN COUNCIL.—A special meeting of the Summerside Town Council was held in Council Chamber Friday night the Mayor and all the Councillors except Councillor McNeill being present. Mr. John Morrison was appointed assessor in place of Mr. J. C. Jardine who resigned. A resolution asking the Dominion Government to have a suitable Town Clock installed on the Post Office building was unanimously passed. The matter of securing proper legislation to enable the council to vote sums of money to seed fairs, exhibitions, hospitals, Public Library and other institutions was again before the board. Mayor Saunders submitted a copy of the law re this matter in existence in Charlottetown, which made legal all grants previously made and provided for the granting from time to time such sums as the council may decide upon. Councillor McFarlane was at first inclined to set the limit of any sum voted at \$50.00, but later withdrew his objection. Councillor Jardine suggested that it would be well to add an additional clause, calling upon institutions receiving a grant under the heading to produce their books to the finance committee of the Council, if so required by them, before receiving the grant and moved a motion to that effect. The rest of the Councillors also expressed themselves favorable to Councillor Jardine's motion which was adopted, and a motion recommending the motion re this matter passed at the last meeting and the substitution of the act now in existence.
