PRODUCE

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Oct. 27—Cheese declined cent a pound on the Montreal dairy and produce market today, while butter and eggs were about the same. With demand from the other side slow, Ontario cheese dropped off to 8 cents a pound while Quebec was quoted at 8 1/2 cents. Despite the fact that prices are now very low, sales for exports are reported as brisk. Arrivals today totalled 1,023 boxes. Owing to the lightness of supplies of fresh eggs the egg market remains unchanged. Graded shipments in carlots or less of fresh eggs from Ontario were quoted mostly at 37 to 38 cents a dozen for extras, 31 to 32 cents for seconds while storage eggs were quoted at 21 cents for extras, 19 cents for firsts and 16 to 18 cents for seconds. Receipts amounted to 523 cases. No 1 grade butter in carlots or less remained at 19 1/2 cents a pound with the market quiet. A total of 183 boxes was offered for sale. Recent heavy supplies of potatoes from the Maritime coast prices of New Brunswick green mountains, 10 cents per 80 pound bag to 70 to 75 cents. Quebecs were still 65 to 70 cents per 80 pound bag.

ness. Had he remained sound he would have beaten two minutes. He was sired by The Abbe 2.04 pacing 2.05 1-2 trotting, raced so successfully by the late Ed. S. Geers. The Abbe is also the sire of Abbe Trotter 2.04 3-4, holder of the Charlottetown track trotting record of 2:10 1-4.

The compilers of trotting statistics are having considerable trouble with a horse called Lull Tap, as she raced at both gaits. One week she started in a pacing event and won it and later on in the week won two trotting events. Her record on the pace is 2:05 3-4 and on the trot 2:08 1-4, both made over a half mile track. The change from pace to trot is accomplished by taking off the hoppers and adjusting a pair of four ounce toe weights.
