PRODUCTION OF CLAY PRODUCTS IN MAY

Canadian producers reported shipments of clay and clay products valued at \$223,910 in May as against \$124,445 in April and \$403,561 in May, 1932. During the first five months of 1933 the total Canadian production was worth \$632,911; in the corresponding period of 1932 the production value was \$1,707,313.

Exports of clay and clay products from Canada during May were valued at \$7,608; April exports were worth \$4,398. Canada's imports of clay and clay products in May were appraised at \$432,250, an increase of 47.7 per cent. over the April total of \$292,749. Great Britain supplied 90.5 per cent. of the May importations; the United States, 25.8 per cent.; Japan, 8.8 per cent.; Germany 8.1 per cent. and France, Belgium, Czechoslovakia, Palestine, Italy, China, the Netherlands, Denmark and Hong Kong, the remainder.

Statue Visible at Sea

Half a mile above Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, was recently erected an enormous statue of Christ the Redeemer. It is said to be located higher than any other religious monument in the world, 3,000 feet and it can be seen for a distance of many miles by land and sea. The statue itself stands 125 feet high and the out-stretched arms form a cross measuring 92 feet from finger-tip to finger-tip. Its completion required ten years of planning and construction work. At its base a great stone contains a chapel.

The cost, \$250,000, was paid by contributions of the people, the faithful of Brazil—even the humblest—having had in their homes for years special contribution boxes in which they put their small coins toward the erection of this stone image of the Saviour. The statue was illuminated from a button pushed by Guglielmo Marconi from his yacht in Italian waters.

SWEDEN'S FOREIGN TRADE

STOCKHOLM, Sweden, Aug. 8.—The official report on Sweden's foreign trade during June, just issued by the Royal Board of Trade shows a continued and very marked improvement of the balance of foreign trade in comparison with the corresponding month of 1932. For the first time in two years the month of June shows a surplus of export over import, which amounts to 14,000,000 kronor.

The total foreign trade figures for the first half of 1933 show an improvement in comparison with 1932 of about 6,000,000 kronor from an import surplus of 138,000,000 for the first six months' period of 1932 to only 72,000,000 for 1933. The export increase during the past month is especially due to marked rises in the export of wood pulp, timber and pig iron, three of Sweden's most important standard products.
