Surviving are her husband, her son, Benjamin, Murray Harbour North; also two nieces, Ella, Mrs. John MacCormack, East Boston; and Mrs. G. Crook, Waterbury, Mass., who spent the earlier years of their lives with their aunt, and who visited her during her last illness.
