Twenty years is a long time for one party to hold the reins of office in any country and in a land like ours where the will of the people is supreme it is safe to assume that no party could have held on so long without having rendered some useful service to the people.

was shamefully neglected and still burdened with the intolerable three short-haul rate. They thus imposed obstacles in the way of all who were laboring to have such conditions improved, or to secure the payment of our just claims against the Dominion.

But in process of time it lost a number of its ablest men by death and removal to other fields of activity, its election methods became more and more questionable and mistakes were made which common prudence would have avoided.

With the overturn in Dominion politics, the open vote and the contention of the Liberal press that it is all-important to have the federal and provincial Governments "in line" became powerful weapons in the hands of the local Conservatives, the result of which was apparent in the election in Charlottetown on Wednesday last.

In recent years its repeated rejection of the ballot in provincial elections made it appear a retrogressive rather than a progressive party. And it was not well served by its press organs, which were quite needlessly abusive in their treatment of both political opponents and independents, thus making enemies of that portion of the community from which alone new recruits might have been gained.

But it must not be forgotten that the Liberal electorate of the Province is still a very large and influential body, altogether out of proportion to the handful of members it has elected to the new Legislature. The party will rise to strength and importance again in the years to come, and its return to power will be hastened or delayed just in proportion to its ability and readiness to avoid and retrieve the errors of the past and to shape a progressive and useful program for the future.

FIGHTING TUBERCULOSIS.

In the year 1899 there was but one institution in Ontario for the care and cure of consumptives; now there are twelve of them in the Province, and others projected, four dispensaries and an increasing number of visiting nurses, while a general campaign is being carried on. The rate of mortality from the disease has been reduced from 11.8 per cent of the total deaths to 7.6 per cent.

British Columbia opened a splendid new sanatorium at Tranquille last year with accommodation for over 100 patients. Saskatchewan is about to establish an institution, while Manitoba has a sanatorium at Ninette and a temporary home in Winnipeg for advanced cases. Nova Scotia has its sanatorium at Kentville, which is always full and is of great benefit to the community.

New Brunswick is about to establish an institution, as recommended by the commission appointed to study the question. St. John has a dispensary, as Charlottetown has, and local leagues in Fredericton and Moncton are reported to be doing good work and providing for needy cases. Quebec Province has institutions at Montreal, St. Agathe, Lake Edward, and Quebec city.

THE COMING SESSION.

The coming session of the Legislature may be expected to form a contrast to those which we have had in recent years in several respects. The over-whelming Conservative majority may be expected to assure the easy passage of such measures as the Government may devise for the public good. The long party debates which were so conspicuous a feature of recent sessions, will probably be wanting in the Legislative proceedings of this year.

HAD STIFF FIGHT BRITISH TROOPS WITH TRIBESMEN.

BURSHIRE, Persia, Jan. 1.—The British government has lost no time in expressing its intention of the government to increase the number of Indian troops employed in southern Persia, to protect the British consulates and the trade routes. Quick action, however, was considered necessary by the recent attack near Kazeroun by Kabal tribesmen on the British consul, W. A. Smart, while being escorted to his post at Shiraz by a detachment of Indian soldiers. The British protected cruiser Lox arrived here last evening and landed 170 men of the Indian infantry against possible contingencies. Further details have been received of the attack on Consul Smart. The consul's escort was engaged twice. On the first occasion they drove off the natives, who were cleared from the hills with the loss of only one killed and one wounded on the British side, and on the second occasion the British had to fight a rear guard action for eight miles. They saved the convoy including a large amount of specie. In this encounter the British lost five men killed and ten wounded. Consul Smart himself was injured but only slightly.

EDMUND LAMY ESTABLISHES A NEW RECORD.

SARANAK LAKE, N. Y., Jan. 1.—Edmund Lamy, former amateur skating champion, covered a hundred yards on the lake today in 9 seconds from a standing start in an exhibition trial. The record has been 0.35 seconds, made by Morris Wood in 1903. Lamy's feat is remarkable because he skated around a circular track and was not paced. In another exhibition he beat all former barrel jumping records by leaping seven barrels, ends up, and twelve on their sides, one more in each case than he ever did before. Lamy entered the professional skating ranks this winter, having lost his amateur standing by playing professional baseball.
