Boxing Card At Fredericton Is Success

FREDERICTON, March 17 (CP)—In a heavy boxing card consisting of 18 bouts, staged at the waxy Beaverbrook Gym here tonight, in the third annual invitation boxing meet, the feather-weight bout between Robinson, of Charlottetown Navy team, and Charlie Bunker, U.N.B. provided the most action and fireworks of the evening. In the first round, Bunker, the slicer boxer had Robinson on the canvas for a nine count, but the Island scrapper came back strong. The judges scored a close decision, in the U.N.B. entreat.

In the feature bout of the evening, Boy McLauslin of U.N.B. Marine Intercollegiate Light-weight champion, and New Brunswick Amateur Light-weight champion, was awarded the decision over Oliver Geldart, former Nova Scotia Light-weight, Geldart a scintillating put up a good exhibition and forced the referee to go all out to win the decision. About 1200 attended the card.

Air Force Wins Quebec Senior Opener

MONTREAL, March 17 (CP)—Montreal Air Force downed Ottawa Commandos 4-3 tonight to capture the first game of a best-of-five Quebec Senior Hockey League final as AC2 Pete Morin scored the winning goal in the second overtime period.

The armen had a tough struggle against the heavier army team and for a time it seemed as though the Commandos could pull through, but Morin's goal early in the overtime session settled the match and the flyers played defensive hockey for the rest of the game.

Pte. Kenny Kilrea netted the first goal for Ottawa in the opening frame on a long shot from the blue line and five minutes later Spr. Alex Shilbicky whipped a pass from Ptes. Neil and Mac Colville into AC2 Claude Bourque. Then Bourque tightened his game and the flyers themselves began to put on pressure.

AC2 Jimmy Haggarty sent the armen into the scoring column, collecting passes from AC2 Allison MacNicol and AC2 Bobby Lee, who played earlier in the season for Montreal Royals and joined the R.C.A.F. today.

In the second period, Haggarty scored a deadeck when MacNicol served up a pass with another assist coming from AC2 Herman Gruhn.

Mac Colville lifted the Commandos into front a second time when Sgt. Walt Murray while AC2 Bert Laprade was in the penalty box. But the flyers replied a few minutes later when Lee tallied on passes from MacNicol and Gruhn.

Easier To Control U-Boats In St. Lawrence Area

OTTAWA, March 17 (CP)—Admiral Sir Percy Noble, Chief of the British Admiralty mission at Washington, said today at a press conference that submarines can be dealt with more easily in the Gulf of St. Lawrence than in the Ocean.

An authority on anti-submarine warfare, the Admiral had high praise for the work of the Royal Canadian Navy in contributing to Atlantic escorts. He was Commander-in-Chief of the western approaches to Britain for two years before his recent assignment to Washington and had charge of operations against submarines in the area where they are most active.

"I think the Gulf of St. Lawrence is an easier problem than the sea," he said. "You can use small ships to greater advantage there. I am sure your naval people had made ample provision for keeping it clear this year."

The St. Lawrence River was really a "Bill of the Sea" because it was upwards of 30 miles wide in the stretches where ships were sunk.

He expressed greater advantage could be used to better advantage on the ocean and that fair-sized corvettes, and trawlers, with as many aircraft as could be obtained, could combat the submarine in the river and gulf.

Now Or Never For Canadiens

Montreal Canadiens took on New York Rangers tonight in the game that will determine if they must win to make the National Hockey League play-offs. At the same time, Detroit Red Wings must defeat the Chicago Black Hawks in Detroit.

Canadiens had a fine workout today. Their players are all in shape and free from injuries, and club officials report they are keyed up for the final effort. A victory, of course, will avail them nothing if the Hawks manage to win the Red Wings.

Royals Play Sydney Tonight

The Charlottetown Junior Royals left here tonight for Sydney, P.E.I. to play the Maritime Junior Hockey League final.

The Charlottetown team is making the trip by road in order to cut down travelling expenses.

Hockey officials here conceded that the trip would be a tough one for the armen, although they start on equal terms with the Bruins following the 4-4 tie here last Friday in the series opener.

The Royals will be playing on a strange rink and will have the effects of the trip against them. However, they hope to turn the breaks to their advantage better than they did here when they took a 3-0 lead in the first period only to see it vanish in the next two.

Only 3 Tons Out Of Every 1,000 Lost

OTTAWA, March 17 (CP)—Navy Minister Macdonald said tonight that only three out of every 1,000 tons of shipping moving through the Gulf of St. Lawrence had been sunk since that time he has not lost the Battle of the Gulf.

The Minister replied to charges of shipping losses and war incidents in the St. Lawrence area which have been made by Hon. Onesime Gagnon (Un. Matane) of the Quebec Legislature and by J. S. Roy (Ind. Gaspé) in the House of Commons.

Mr. Macdonald gave the names of 18 merchantmen, a corvette and a patrol ship lost in the St. Lawrence area. This was the total known to the Navy and compared with charges of Mr. Gagnon that more than 30 ships had been lost.

Mr. Roy had spoken of a "battle" lasting 1-2 hours between two corvettes and a U-boat in the St. Lawrence in which no assistance from aircraft had been received by the surface craft. Mr. Macdonald said that in fact there was no battle. The incident was simply two corvettes engaged in gun practice on the river. There was no submarine.

The defenses of the Gulf and river this year would be stronger than last year. "But I am not saying that even if we double or treble the naval forces there that we could guarantee complete immunity from submarine attack," he said.

"That is something no nation in the world has succeeded in doing."

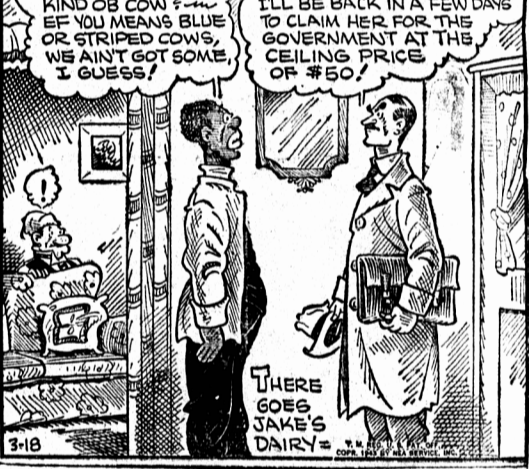
BONSHAW W.M.S. MEETING

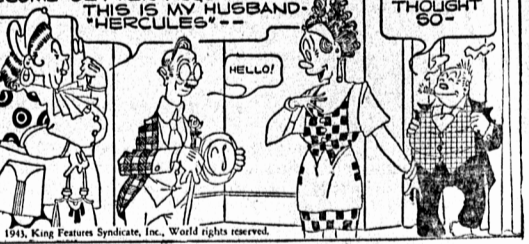
