Five Elections Put Governments Back in Office

OTTAWA, Dec. 19. — (CP) — Political winds blew favourably in 1949 for five Canadian governments which called elections.

Prime Minister St. Laurent, fighting his first general election as head of the Liberal party, was returned to office with the largest group any party ever had in the House of Commons. The party, in office for the past 14 years, won 193 out of 262 seats.

The Coalition governments of British Columbia and Manitoba were returned with increased representation and the Liberal government of Nova Scotia was re-elected with a slightly reduced majority. In Newfoundland, the first provincial election following the island's entry into Confederation March 31, brought the election of a Liberal government.

Mr. St. Laurent took over the prime ministership from Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King in November, 1948. He led the government through one session and then called an election for June 27.

The Progressive Conservatives with George Drew, former Ontario premier as their new leader, made what appeared to be a strong bid for power. But when the voting was over, Mr. St. Laurent and his party had gained ground all across the country at the expense of the Progressive Conservatives, the C. C. F. and the Social Credit parties.

The 1947 redistribution act, increasing Commons Representation by 10 seats, took effect with the election. Newfoundland's entry into Confederation added another seven seats, raising the total from 245 to 262.

Following are final results of the election with the party representation at dissolution April 30, in brackets.

Liberals 193 (126); Progressive Conservatives 41 (69); C. C. F. 13 (32); Social Credit 10 (12); Independents four (three); Independent Liberal one (none). Total 262.

Eight by-elections were called Oct. 24 to fill vacancies caused by six government appointments and two deaths. The Liberals retained four and lost three of the seats. But the losses were to two independent Liberals and one Independent who had campaigned in support of the government. They were

Christmas shopping started earlier than usual. Thousands were attracted to the bigger and better-stocked toy fairs featuring cheaper and clever toys. Provincial Elections

In Nova Scotia, the provincial Liberal government was re-elected June 9 for the fifth consecutive time since 1933.

The Liberals captured 26 of the 37 seats in the House of Assembly compared to seven for the Progressive Conservatives and two for the C. C. F. In the 1945 election, when there were only 30 seats in the Assembly, the Liberals won 28 and the C. C. F. two.

In Newfoundland, the Liberals won 22 seats in the 28-member Legislature. Progressive Conservatives won five seats. The other seat went to Peter Cashin, outspoken opponent of union with Canada.

The Liberals were led by Joseph Smallwood, a man largely responsible for bringing the island into Confederation. The election was held May 27, two months after union.

In British Columbia, the Coalition government—a fusion of Liberals and Progressive Conservatives—defeated a C. C. F. bid for power. The Coalition, returned for a third term, won 39 seats of the 48-member Legislative Assembly. The C. C. F. won seven seats and an Independent and a Labor candidate one each.

In the 1945 election, the Coalition won 37 seats, the C. C. F. 10 and an Independent one.

The Manitoba Coalition, a fusion of Liberal-Progressives and Progressive Conservatives, won handily capturing 44 of the 57 seats in the Legislature.

The Coalition included 29 Liberal-Progressives, 10 Progressive Conservatives, four Independents and one Liberal. The opposition included seven C. C. F., two Conservatives, one Independent Liberal, one Independent Progressive Conservative, and one Labor-Progressive.

In the 1945 election, the Coalition won 42 of the then 55 seats in the Assembly.
