

BRITAIN AGREES WITH WASHINGTON

Not to Interfere With Shipments of Copper to Well Known Italian, Swiss and Dutch Manufacturers

LONDON, Jan. 4.—The British Government's reply to the American note concerning contraband probably will be sent before the end of this week. An outline of the reply has been submitted to France which is greatly interested because of the activity of French ships in searching Mediterranean cargoes. Probably there will be a statement issued shortly showing that Italy and England and her Allies have arrived at an understanding concerning contraband satisfactory to all countries affected.

RUSSIANS STILL SWEEPING THE GERMANS BEFORE THEM

German Regiment Attacked With Bayonets and Several Hundreds Killed, Remains Surrendered. Since Jan. 1st Russians Took 2000 Prisoners and Number of Guns. Przemyśl now Being Devasted by Pestilence and Famine. 5000 Turks Taken Prisoners With Guns and Ammunition.

PETROGRAD, Jan. 4.—(Official)—A strong artillery combat has been fought all along the front on the left bank of the Vistula. On the night of January 2nd, we discovered a passage of Germans across the Bzura, in the vicinity of Kozioff and Biscoupi. Having watched the construction by the enemy's forces, one of our glorious regiments surrounded the Germans. They attacked them with bayonets without firing a shot, and in the hand-to-hand struggle which followed, killed several hundred men. The survivors saved their lives by surrendering. German infantry attacked our position near Borjnow, Northeast of Boli-mowo but the German assault was repulsed with enormous losses by fire from several batteries. A counter-attack was made with bayonets.

In Galicia fighting around Corlice and Zakliczyn continues. In the region of Uzok Pass and Rostoki (South of Lisko) we have made progress. We drove back the enemy who fled in great disorder. We captured two thousand prisoners and some machine guns. Several Austrian companies surrendered in a body. In their retreat to Uzok the Austrians abandoned arms and ammunition. Official from Russian Staff, Caucasus—In the region of Sarikamysh, on January 1, the great battle continued. We captured the 50th regiment of infantry almost complete, including the commander, and his officers. The total of Turkish prisoners amounts to 5,000 soldiers, 40 officers and several surgeons. We also captured six pieces of mountain artillery, 14 machine guns and ammunition.

PARIS, Jan. 4.—(Official)—From the Russian Garrison at Ardahan. They are however displaying anxiety for their remaining possession in Europe by fortifying the whole coast line. What they fear is not disclosed for it is considered hardly possible for the Allies to land sufficient force to prove a menace to them. It is possible that they anticipate an invasion from another source. Indications point to the Balkan States which are now neutral taking a hand in the war.

CAPTAIN GOES DOWN WITH HIS SHIP

Formidable Sank in a few Minutes. A Cutter Foundered and all on Board Were Drowned in the Turbulent Sea.

BRIXHAM DEVON, Jan. 3.—Survivors of the battleship Formidable which went down in the English Channel after having struck a mine or been torpedoed by a German submarine have been brought here. They relate that the warship was struck about the magazine. The explosion was terrible, but the magazine was not reached. Had this also blown up the ship would have foundered with-out there being time to save anybody. As the water rushed in the men on the Formidable hurried to the deck. They found the vessel had already listed to starboard. Small boats were sent out. A cutter foundered and all men in her were drowned. A launch and pinnace succeeded in getting away. Captain Loxley and signalmen were still on the bridge when the battleship keeled over and went down.

AN ACCIDENT AT ROLLO BAY

A deplorable accident occurred at Rollo Bay on Monday morning, January 4, when James Coffin, of Fortune Bridge had his arm frightfully mangled while cranking a gasoline engine. It was so badly hurt that only the flesh supported the hand. Doctors Macdonald and Sullivan, Souris, were summoned and amputated the arm at the elbow. The unfortunate man was about to begin thrashing for William R. Webster, Rollo Bay, when he met with his accident.

KELLY'S CROSS CHURCH TO BE REBUILT IN THE SPRING

At a meeting held in Kelly's Cross parish on Sunday last it was decided to commence to rebuild, in the spring, the church destroyed by fire on Christmas Day. It was agreed to obtain estimates on the cost of a brick construction, as well as one of lumber, in order to decide whether or not a brick church should be erected. A subscription list was opened, with the extremely gratifying result that over \$7,600 was pledged, payable in five years. The amount represents an average of about \$100 from every house in the parish, and is a high tribute to the magnanimity, self-sacrifice and devotion of the people of Kelly's Cross. Previous to the meeting, which was very largely attended, the Holy Rosary and other special prayers were offered for a speedy and favourable peace.

THE WORK OF THE STEAMER EARL GREY

Mr. Alfred Baines, electrician of the C. G. S. Earl Grey, who was the only man from this province to go with the ship to Archangel, Russia, writes home an interesting description of the consecration of the Earl Grey by which she was renamed the Canada by the Russian Government. The consecration was held on board the ship by the Archbishop of Archangel assisted by the clergy and choir, the chief of the Government office at Archangel, members of the local house, the foreign consuls, board of trade, etc., also British naval officers who brought the ship from Canada. The Archbishop, after prayers and hymns sprinkled different parts of the ship with holy water. On reaching the dining saloon, champagne was offered the guests, the Vice-Governor gave the toast to the Czar and King George which was followed by the Russian national anthem and British burrahs, on agreeing to send a telegram to the Czar. Then came a cheer for the Grand Duke Nicholas, commander of the Russian forces and a speech by M. Gallezhi, (late member of the Duma). He referred to the grateful action of the Russian people as this by which this ship had been placed at the disposal of Russia. He hoped for a peaceful future and that the day would soon dawn when there would be no more wars. "We should never forget," he said, "that the British Empire and Russia have been as brothers in this terrible time and that it should ever be so. I therefore raise my cup for the industry of Great Britain and her colonies." The British officers were asked to say God Save the King and had to repeat it twice again. Mr. Baines says that the Earl Grey of Canada is doing splendid work and the Russians are very pleased with her. Without her, he says, Archangel would have been closed to navigation long ago and as Archangel is the only Russian port open it means a great deal to Russia and England too, to keep it open. If she keeps on doing such good work there should be no difficulty. The river is very narrow in some places only 400 feet wide. There are steamships on each side which have to be broken out and taken in and out to sea. Most of them are bound for British ports. Archangel is a busy place just now with enormous exports and imports. Mr. Baines speaks of the gratitude the Russians are very pleased with their splendid ice-breaker and the kindness with which he and the wireless operators are treated from the Captain down. Everything possible is done for their comfort and to make their stay as pleasant as possible. Mr. Baines and the two wireless operators are the only ones of the Canadian or British crew who were asked to stay.

Crosby, Mr. Elmer Ritchie, who only to name is an assurance of excellence. Needless to say, the large audience was delighted with the programme.

PREMIER EN ROUTE FOR FORT WILLIAM

WINNIPEG, Dec. 29.—Premier Borden and Lady Borden left for Fort William tonight. At his departure the Premier said, "I have enjoyed myself immensely. I cannot say when I have ever enjoyed myself more, and I have delivered four addresses to-day." GREECE PREPARING TO MAINTAIN NEW TERRITORIES

LONDON, Jan. 3.—An extremely rainy winter, the worst in Europe for years, causing floods in the rivers and valleys on the Continent as well as those of England, and preventing operations on a large scale on the Western front, has seriously interfered with those in the East. There have been heavy artillery engagements from the sea to the Swiss borders, occasional attacks by the Infantry of the opposing armies when not repulsed have added a few yards to the territory in possession of the attacking force and always proved costly adventures. The French have gained a little ground north of a point where the line turns eastward to the East of Rheims, and Southwest of Verdun where attempts to make German positions at St. Mihiel on Meuse untenable are proceeding slowly. They have also made some advance in Alsace but suffered a repulse to the Northwest of Saint Mennehoult. In the east the Germans have captured an important Russian position at Borjnow; elsewhere they have been unable to make headway against the Russians who, as defenders in a fortified position, are aided by the wet weather and muddy roads which hinder German movements. The Austrians claim to have checked the Russian advance near Gorlice on the south Galacian Railway west of Jaslo. Apparently the battle here has not yet concluded. The Russians on the other hand have taken an Austrian position near Uzok Pass which should open another entrance for them through the Carpathians into Hungary while the Austrian retreat in Bukovina is described by the Russians as a rout. The Turks have crossed the Russian border in the Caucasus and according to their own account defeated a

BERLIN REPORTS SUBMARINE LOST

It is said all on board the submarine were lost. The identity of the submarine has not been revealed in the reports telling of her loss. The Admiralty states that at present it has no information to give out.

PESTILENCE SPREADING IN PRZEMYSL GARRISON

LEMBERG, Galicia, Jan. 4.—It is reported that pestilence is spreading in the city among the garrison of Przemyśl, which is now almost without provisions. Infectious sores still continue from Przemyśl, but are less vigorously pushed. This is due, it is thought, to the garrison's knowledge of the failure of an Austrian relief force to break through the Russian lines.

FRANCE IS AFTER GERMANY'S TRADE

PARIS, Dec. 29.—France is going to make effort to obtain her share of the world's trade which was formerly in the hands of Germany. Gaston Thomson presided today at a large meeting of merchants and manufacturers who are members of the Paris Chamber of Commerce. He told the businessmen that this was the time for them to reach out for trade in all countries where Germany previously had been a large purveyor. Before the meeting adjourned a Committee, representing the principal industries and financial institutions of France, had been chosen to organize this work of expansion.

SEND UNDESIRABLES BACK TO CANADA

LONDON, Jan. 2.—A third batch of thirty-nine undesirables attached to the Canadian contingent at Salisbury Plain were shipped to Canada during the weekend on board the Hesperian.

CAPITAL OF GERMAN EAST AFRICA TAKEN BY BRITISH SHIPS

NAIROBI, British East Africa, Jan. 4.—The British battleship Goliath and the light cruiser Fox have carried out successfully the operations against Dar es Salaam, capital of German East Africa. The warships bombarded the town, inflicting considerable damage. All German vessels in the harbour were disabled. Fourteen Europeans and twenty natives were taken prisoners. The British losses were one killed and twelve wounded. Dar es Salaam is the best built town on the coast of German East Africa. It is a military station, with an excellent harbour, situated forty miles south of Zanzibar. It is the terminus of an important caravan route and the residence of the Governor and has large commercial interests. While the population in 1909 was estimated at 1,000, the total population is more than 20,000.

PITTSBURG MEN EN-LIST IN TORONTO

PITTSBURG, Pa., Jan. 2.—News that the number of Pittsburgh men serving in the Canadian contingent of the British army had been increased by two, was received here today, when Captain Ross H. Corbett, formerly of the fourteenth regiment, N. G. P., and F. Gregg Husler, a former non-commissioned officer in the same command, wrote from Toronto, asking for their discharge papers. They were said to have enlisted at Toronto. Corbett served several enlistments in the national guard before reaching his captaincy and Husler received his military education in a military academy.

THE SHORT COURSE OPENED YESTERDAY IN CHARLOTTETOWN

The formal opening of the Short Course in Agriculture took place in the Prince of Wales College Hall last evening, a large number of students being in attendance. The Commissioner of Agriculture, Hon. Murdoch McKinnon, presided. The Premier, Hon. J. A. Mathieson, addressed the meeting. He said that he had had the pleasure the year before of meeting the class in that hall, and he noticed a great contrast between the present class and that of last year. He could not help being struck by the number of young men and women out of proportion to the same number in former years. It was gratifying to see that in the days of their youth they were realising the importance of being fitted for the work of their life. They had reason to blame very much the kind of education that had brought about the present disastrous war. There was much to avoid in the pride that had developed in German education, and that haughty spirit which went before the faults in the education of Germany, there were also merits in their methods that they should endeavour to emulate.
