There is one millionaire's house on Fifth Avenue which is surrounded by a monster iron railing for protection. At 42nd Street is the great white marble Library Building, the combined Astor, Lenox and Tilden. Near the temple Emanuel Synagogue, Night and Day Bank, Delmonico's and Sherry's, Church of the Heavenly Rest, Windsor Arcade built on the site of the Windsor Hotel, on the corner above Miss Helen Gould's city home, and around the corner is the Fifth Avenue Baptist Church—Dr. Aked's. Grand Central Station is on 42nd Street just east of the Avenue, the great station for all trains North, East and West; opposite is the great Belmont Hotel, Grand Union and Murray Hill, with subway station. Here is the Belmont East River Tunnel Terminal, the first to carry passengers under either of the great rivers. At 50th Street and Fifth Avenue stands the great White Marble Catholic Cathedral with its cloud-piercing spires, and in the rear, facing Madison Avenue, are the residences of the Archbishop and rector; opposite the cathedral is the Buckingham Hotel and residences of Vanderbilts, Sloanes, Mrs. Russell Sage, Union and Democratic Clubs, and up the Avenue, at the corner of 53rd Street, is St. Thomas Episcopal Church, University Club, St. Regis and Gotham Hotels; opposite is the home of ex-vice-president Morton and Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church. On Broadway from 23rd Street north, at 27th Street Victoria Hotel, 29th Street Breslin, 31st Street New Grand, 32nd Street Imperial and Mar-
