Sunday School Lesson

Third Quarter: Lesson 11: 1 Samuel X: 1-4; 19-25; July 10, 1927.

Golden Text: Thy loving kindness is before mine eyes. And I have walked in thy truth. Psalm XXVI: 3.

Samuel's Farewell (The Story.)

The Greek nation five hundred years later presents an analogy to the Hebrew at this time. In both instances there was a loose federation of tribes held together by common religious ideas within and threatening enemies without. Samuel was the Hebrew Aristides. He prepared the way for the centralization of power in one person. The need was imperative for the federation was on the point of dissolution. These were pitiful days. The Tabernacle was removed, the ark sequestered. God was dethroned, his worship suspended. Israel was not only captive to Philistia, but captive to the gods of Philistia. The age was crude and cruel. Modes of warfare were barbaric, morality relaxed and corruption complete. Hope centered in one person. He was known to all frequenters of the Tabernacle because of his continued residence in it. Continuity of service gave him prestige. Never having wavered himself he was qualified to call others to steadfastness. He awakened the dormant religious sentiment. The salient character and light of his example were corrective of the dark and corrupt conditions. Samuel was an innovator. He did what was required without reference to precedent. For example, when the priesthood was practically disbanded he himself performed its functions, though he did not belong to the priestly tribe. He founded a new order, that of the prophet. He opened colleges where candidates for the new office might be trained. The order proved its value as a counterpoise to despotism and formalism. But Samuel's greatest service to the State was his inauguration of the monarchy around which the chaotic fragments of the nation found cohesion. He drew for Israel what Bismarck did for Germany. Both made—the throne what the Chancellor called it, not an ornamental cupola, but a central pillar.

UNDER THE STUDY LAMP.

The institution of the Judgeship in Israel must not be regarded as failure because it was finally discarded. It survived four hundred and sixty years, three hundred of which were peaceful during which liberty was enjoyed and justice administered. Samuel was an intercessor, like Moses he pleaded for an erring people. He is named among the Intercessors in Psalm XCIX. That the historic book covering this period had common sources is evident. The identity of several paragraphs in Samuel and Chronicles proves that they were copied from the same manuscript. The notion that the name attached to books of the Bible indicates that the person was the author is now discarded. Among all "farewells," which constitute a distinct literature, this of Samuel really shines. It is a model which might be read with advantage by any person about to lay down his office. It has the ring of courageous fidelity. Samuel can challenge impeachment. There is no flock in his public or private career. With one voice the people attested his unswerving career. But the retiring judge was not seeking praise of men. He wished only to gain a vantage ground from which he could caution the subjects of the new empire. Samuel put Hebrew history in a nutshell. He showed Israel's path paved with God's mercy, but stained with man's sin. He reproved for ingratitude, but on contrition interceded for and comforted the people. There is great advantage from one godly life lived continuously in a community. It is an argument not easily confuted. The ultimate defense of religion is in boots not in books. A long stainless religious career is an augmenting trust. Infidelity to such a trust not only renders it valueless, but converts it into a weapon against the truth. The unwavering discipline alone can infuse the same spirit in his fellows. Steadfastness is the word to conjure by.

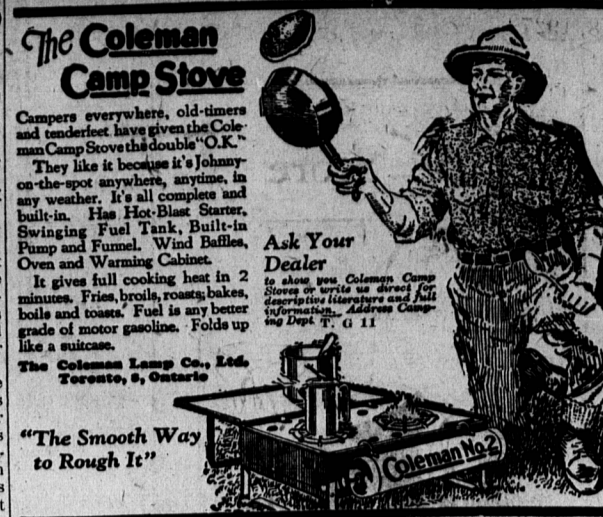
