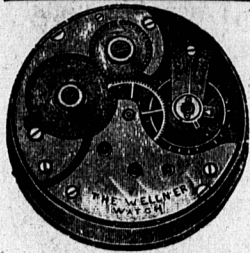


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THE QUEEN'S COUNTY GUARDIAN

The Reverend Principal Gordon of Queen University, who in the course of a long career has made innumerable speeches in the General Assembly, made one of the best addresses of his life in an advocacy of Church Union at the session yesterday. His declaration was greeted with continued applause, and his statement that the policy of the Church must be to cooperate with the negotiating churches with organic union definitely in view was most warmly received. The union question, he declared, would never go down until it was settled right. During the union of 1874 as an illu- stration he declared that the present opposition to union, would, after further conference, very largely disappear. He defended vigorously the establishment of a settlement committee, and declared that the present method of stationing ministers in the Presbyterian Church had broken down. The need of a simpler confession of faith was apparent in the fact that every year in the graduating classes of the colleges there were students of tender consciences, who signed the old confession with much mental reservation. Edmonton ex- (Rev. Dr. Gordon is well known in this province) Rev. H. E. Thomas, St. John, formerly Pastor of the First Methodist Church, Charlottetown, is taking as active an interest as ever in the Temperance Cause. A St. John exchange reports that large audiences at several meetings in different parts of the city Sunday heard J. W. Keirstead, one of the Liberal candidates endorsed by temperance speakers and reasons put forward for his election, while in some cases the government was unhesitatingly condemned and an appeal made for the support of the entire Liberal ticket. Besides public meetings in the afternoon in the Unique Theatre, Temple Hall, North End, and Temperance Hall, West Side, the issues in the present campaign were also forcibly presented from two pulpits, Rev. Dr. Hutchison speaking in Main street Baptist church, and Rev. W. R. Robinson in Ludlow street Baptist church. The speakers at the afternoon meetings were: Rev. H. E. Thomas, Rev. Miles McCutcheon, Rev. L. A. MacLean, Rev. Wilfrid Gaetz, Rev. W. Camp and Rev. Mr. Robinson. The meeting in the Unique Theatre Sunday afternoon, under the auspices of the Temperance Federation, was well attended and the speakers who condemned the present government for its inactivity in respect to the enforcement of the liquor license laws and its utter disregard for the wishes of the temperance element of the province, were given an attentive hearing. Rev. Mr. Thomas was the first speaker and he said that he had resided in communities where he had seen license laws, Scott Act prohibition and local option in vogue and he believed that the liquor laws could be enforced as well, as any other law.
