and thus cause other railway employees to make similar demands; a disposition to await the various presidential candidates' letters of acceptance and the Stanley Committee's report of its investigation of the Steel Corporation.

These various factors have had a depressing influence on prices which could not be overcome by continued favorable reports from the agricultural regions.

The result has been a manipulative market with selling in evidence.

The report showing the condition of the cotton crop on July 25 will be issued by the Department of Agriculture on August 2, at 12 noon. On Friday, August 9, at 2.15, there will be issued a summary of conditions of the principal grain crops on August 1.

Taking into account all the factors to influence prices there is little on time to base an advance at the present time. Prices may advance a few points, but, in my opinion, stocks sold at the present level can be replaced later lower down.

ANSWERS TO INQUIRIES.

Bethlehem Steel Common and Preferred.—In May the capitalization of this Company was increased from \$29,500,000 to \$79,500,000. About the same time this Company sold \$15,200,000 5 per cent 30 year Mortgage bonds for the purpose of retiring a previous bond issue of \$6,428,000, and providing additional working capital. Mr. S. M. Schwab is the president of this Corporation. The future of Bethlehem Steel shares is naturally dependent upon the business condition of the country. The Company is reported to be doing their normal rate share of the steel business.

The low price of the Preferred shares makes this issue an attractive speculation. I would not advise the purchase of the Common stock.

Wabash Preferred and Common Stock.—The proposed reorganization of this Company anticipates an assessment of \$40 a share on both classes of stock. After the assessment has been levied and collected I believe both issues can be purchased lower than the total of the assessment and present prices for the shares.

This being the case, either the Preferred or Common stock can be replaced cheaper later on.

Northern Pacific.—Earnings for the present year applicable to dividends on the Common Stock are well in excess of the present 7 per cent dividend rate, but will be somewhat lower than last year. Should the favorable crop conditions continue throughout this Company's territory, no doubt it will be reflected in an advance in these shares. At the present selling price around 120 Northern Pacific stock yields 5.8 per cent on the money invested, and should prove profitable if the shares are purchased on any material recession.
