### DEATH OF HON. PETER SINCLAIR.

The death is announced of Hon. Peter Sinclair, which occurred on Tuesday evening last suddenly in Springside. Mr. Sinclair was born in Argyllshire, Scotland eighty-six years ago, the son of Peter Sinclair, Esquire and his wife Mary Crawford. He received his education in Scotland and came to Prince Edward Island when young. As an intelligent and successful farmer, enjoying the confidence and good will of those about him, he was called to the front and elected to the House of Assembly in 1907.

He soon received promotion in the political arena. In 1908 he became a member of the Board of Education and from 1909 to 1911 was a member of the Executive Council. Again in 1912 he was taken into the Haythorne Liberal Administration and acted as Government leader in the Assembly and was also a member of the Board of Public Works. In these several positions his sterling character and earnest attention to public duties won for him the high regard of his colleagues and the general public.

After the union of the Province with the Dominion he was elected, with Hon. David Laird to represent Queen's County in the House of Commons, and was re-elected in 1914, serving till the conclusion of the Parliamentary term in 1916. In the election of that year he suffered defeat, along with many of the Liberal standard bearers throughout the Dominion. In 1922 he was again elected to the House of Assembly for the First District of Queen's, and was four or five times re-elected, serving also as a Member of the Executive Council under the leadership of Hon. Fred Peters.

Mr. Sinclair was repeatedly mentioned for further preferment, in connection with a Senatorship or the Governorship, it being recognized that his claims were strong, although he never pressed them unduly. In political life he was a Liberal of the old school, always moderate in his views of public questions and pursuing a faithful public course. Quiet and unobtrusive in manner, wise in council, earnest, sincere and patriotic, clean and incorruptible, his public career furnishes a model that might well find imitators among our representatives. For some years past he has lived in the retirement of his home enjoying the calm which follows a well-spent life. And now, full of years with the respect of all who knew him, the good man has gone to his reward.

### THE EXHIBITION.

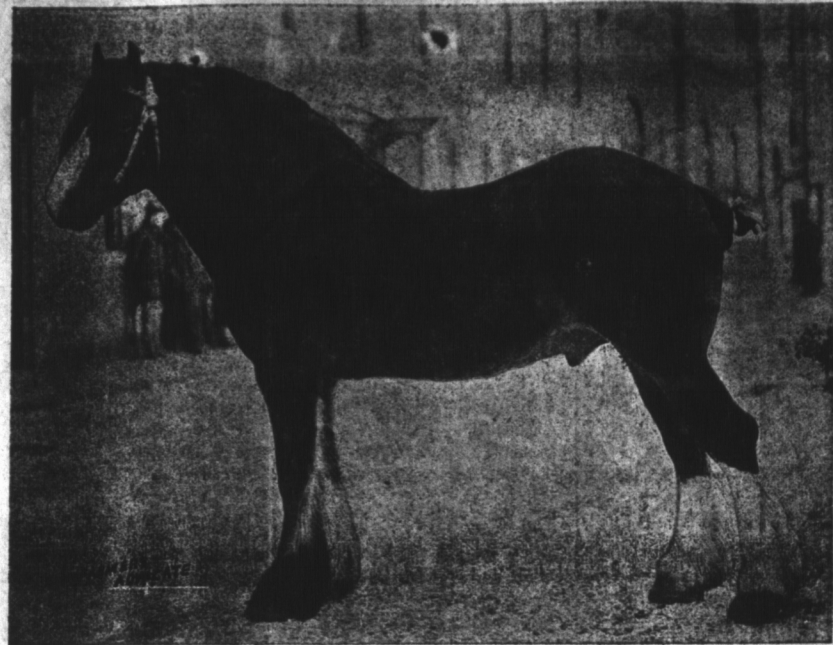
There is really an embarrassment of riches in the stockyards, for which we are indebted in part to the splendid animals from the Mainland, chiefly from Ontario, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. These are objects of great interest to our farmers and stockmen, and must prove an incentive to further development and improvement. No part of the Dominion is better adapted to the growth of the best stock than Prince Edward Island, and the object lesson afforded by the splendid specimens now on view cannot be other than conducive to that end.

The large, orderly, well-dressed crowd of visitors is of itself no small attraction in the building and on the grounds and approaches. Gazing upon them over one gets the impression that it is a well-looking crowd, men and women of good stature, good health and comfortable circumstances, satisfied with themselves and with each other.

Good order, sobriety and good feeling have characterized the proceedings in and about the fair and in the city. Much praise is due to President Hazzard, Secretary Smallwood and the directors for their foresight and care in providing for the smooth working of the entire machinery of the Exhibition. The special police, this year wearing distinctive badges, move about among the crowds, but have little to do beyond giving that sense of security which their presence affords.

Of course there is here and there a fault-finder, or a pessimist, or some strict utilitarian who questions the use of it all. And yet for more than half a century the civilized world has been convinced of the utility and value of just such shows as that now running here, combining as they do instruction and amusement, and registering from year to year the progress our country is making. We cannot therefore regard the question of utility as a debatable one in face of a verdict so universal.

It is not to be expected that an Exhibition with all its multifarious details should run from start to finish without a little friction here or there and some disappointment or dissatisfaction. These are common to all such enterprises. He it said that the present show appears to have been as free from such things as any we have known, and the satisfactory experience of the opening days bids fair to continue to the end.

In conclusion we may say to our readers in town and country that those who have not yet visited the Exhibition of 1906 should do so at once. They will be well repaid by the interest they will receive and information they will derive from the visit. And failing to see it means a lost opportunity to see the best Exhibition ever provided for the people of our Island Province.

A valued correspondent writes The Guardian eloquently and at length calling the attention of the public and especially of Mr. Hughes, M. P. to the condition of the platform at Perth siding on the railway. He says this platform is "unfit for the feet of man or beast." If it is half as bad as our correspondent tells it should be attended to, at once. The pressure of Exhibition matter prevents publication of the letter in full.

Prof. Irving Fisher of Yale University has been conducting a series of experiments to demonstrate the importance of thoroughly chewing our food. The students undergoing the test made no change in their diet, eating whatever they liked but chewing every mouthful thoroughly. It was found that of choice they came to have much less desire for meats and more for cereal foods. But this was only incidental. At the end of five months they had doubled their capacity for physical work and endurance, as shown by the gymnasium tests. It would surely be worth while, in the face of such a record, for those who desire to increase their strength and improve their health to give attention to this matter of thoroughly chewing their food.

The modern craze for speed was illustrated the other day in the automobile race for the Vanderbilt trophy at New York over a twenty-nine mile course, the distance run being 297 miles. Seventeen cars, each traveling with the speed of a cyclone swept round and round this course, the track being lined with tens of thousands of spectators. Three of the cars completed the 297 miles in 297 minutes, the winner, Louis Wagner, on a French car, in 200 minutes and 10 seconds. That was the "glorious" side of the show. It had also its murderous side. Two persons were killed, three reported dying and many others injured. It was a mad exhibition, and even Vanderbilt, the giver of the cup, was so shocked by the results as to say there shall never be another race for his cup in America.
