RUSSIANS ARE RETREATING AND JAPANESE PURSUING.

Russians Says It's Not a General Retreat, Only Falling Back to Stronger Position—Very Heavy Losses—Russians Report that Japs Were Again Repulsed Before Port Arthur.

RUSSIANS RETREATING. LONDON, Sept. 1 (Special)—The war news today is somewhat conflicting but the best information shows the Russian right and centre, defending Liao Yang southward are retreating with the Japanese pursuing. WHAT RUSSIANS SAY. Russian reports declare that Kuropatkin is not making a general retreat but falling back on the inner fortifications, rendered necessary by the fact that the Japanese have crossed the Taitse River northeast of Liao Yang with the evident intention of cutting off his rear. ESTIMATED LOSSES. All advices agree that the fighting of the last two days has been very severe and the losses heavy. The Russians say the Japanese losses are greater than the Russian but no statement is yet made of official report showing exactly how the fight has gone.

TWO GENERALS WOUNDED. The Japanese are believed to have gained considerable success. General Stakeberg was slightly wounded and General Marozovsky seriously. REPULSE AT PORT ARTHUR. Russian reports say the Japanese were repulsed with heavy losses in Tuesday's and Wednesday's fighting at Port Arthur. [The best accounts available indicate that over 200,000 Japanese and about 175,000 Russians are engaged in the great struggle around Liao Yang, the Japanese having 700 guns. The advantage appears to rest with the Japanese who have driven the Russian forces back on Liao Yang, from their positions southwest, south and southeast of the city. Two days ago the Russian position was said to cover a circuit of eight to ten miles. The battle of Liao Yang now takes on the nature of a siege of the central and strong'y fortified position.]

PRINCESS LOUISE AGAIN ESCAPES

Recalling the Former Mat-tasitch Scandal

Hundreds of Retail Druggists Guilty of Contempt of Court, Says a Chicago Judge.

PRINCESS LOUISE OF COBURG. BERLIN, Sept. 1 (Special)—Princess Louise of Coburg, whose relations with Kegelich Mattasitch a former Heutenant in the Austrian army caused a great scandal several years ago, and who has since been kept under the closest restraint, has vanished from Bad-elstar where she has been taking the cure and it is presumed is in the company of Mattasitch, seeking an asylum safe from capture.

SWEEPING CONTEMPT OF COURT. CHICAGO, Sept. 1 (Special)—Twenty-five hundred retail druggists are declared guilty of contempt of court by Judge Dunne and the National Association of Retail Druggists of which they are members is fined \$20 while Thomas Voten, Secretary, is fined \$500. The injunction under which the druggists are fined was secured by Isaac Platt, a retail druggist in Chicago who incurred the Association's displeasure because he would not join it.

SHOT ON A RIFLE RANGE.

BANGOR, Me., August 27.—George A. Whiting, sergeant of company G. N. G. S. M., was shot through the head and killed while acting as marker on the company's shooting range this afternoon. An inquest will be held to-morrow and a rigid investigation made. His companion, who was shooting, says no signal was lost.
