—TEST CASE ENDS.—At the last session of the County Court, Summerside a case of much interest to creditors in this province was tried in the case in question a merchant had obtained a judgment in the County Court but the debtor had always evaded payment claiming that his wife owned the goods and chattels. The merchant however, decided it was time to have a test made of the wife's ownership as the Sheriff of the County had informed him that all debtors in the western part of the province when he went to levy on their goods claimed that the same belonged to the wife and defied the Sheriff to levy. The Sheriff informed him that if this kind of thing was allowed to go on that an execution would be very little good as it had come to be the same story almost everywhere he went with an execution. The merchant decided to make a test of the matter and had the Sheriff levy on the goods. The Sheriff interpleaded and the case went to trial and Judge McQuarrie decided that the said goods and chattels were not the property of the wife at the time of the seizure by the Sheriff and gave judgment for the merchant with costs. The goods has since been sold by the Sheriff under the execution.
