Canadians show great Hockey in beating Boston Bruins 3-2

BOSTON, Nov. 26—(CP)—Montreal Canadiens moved out of the National Hockey League cellar tonight with a 3-2 victory over the fourth place Boston Bruins before 9,000 fans.

Two of Canadiens' tallies were unassisted, and the clincher was supplied by big Jack P. Rinaldi, a former Bruin, during the first minute of the third period when he made a rink-length solo and, after skirting around defenseman Jack Shewchuk, beat goalie Frank Brimsek with a blistering close-up shove. Late in the opening frame, John Quilty, a rock centre, staged out of a quarter-ice face-off staged on the left side of the Boston net after beating rival Art Jackson for the puck, thereby breaking a 1-1 tie.

The Bruins opened the scoring about two minutes earlier by sinking Murph Chamberlain's passout. Roy Conacher got that one back for Bruins with Bill Cowley assisting. And the other Boston counter came from the stick of Eddie Wiseman, who plashed off a five-man rush, with less than five minutes to go.

The Bruins sent out five forwards to press for the tying counter late in the third period, and, with 90 seconds to go, yanked Brimsek out of his cage. In the dying seconds, Charlie Sands twice broke out of a scrimmage to be overtaken from behind as he sped toward the empty net.

SOMEWHERE IN ENGLAND, Nov. 26—(CP)—Gunner Andy Ross, amateur fighter, "who once held the United States Junior" Welterweight title, hammered his way to the top of the light-heavyweight class in the Canadian holding units and now is aiming at a British army boxing crown as well as the C.A.S. F. light-heavy championship.

Brother-in-law of Barney Ross, former welterweight champion of the world, Ross fought in Toronto and Kingston several times before the war and entered Canada from the United States to join the Royal Canadian Artillery. His mother at present lives in Niagara Falls, Ont.

The gunner won his final bout for the holding units light-heavy crown by default. His opponent stood by the ringside and watched Ross knock out a Hamilton, Ont., fighter in 30 seconds in the semi-finals.

That was all the finalist needed to convince him that Ross should fight the final all by himself.

Drillon and Apps lead Leafs to 4-2 victory Over New York Rangers

NEW YORK, Nov. 26—(CP)—Toronto Maple Leafs increased their lead at the top of the National Hockey League race tonight, defeat New York Rangers 4-2. The loss left Rangers in fifth place a point behind Boston Bruins.

The win widened the Leafs' margin over the second-place Detroit Red Wings to four points. Leafs took a commanding lead with three goals within six minutes in the second period, and were never in danger after that. Playing heads-up hockey, they smoothed the Ranger attack throughout, and constantly threatened to pile up an even larger margin through fast breakaway plays.

Syl Apps, Toronto centre, started the scoring when he raced in fast and snapped up a rebound from Nick Metz. While the Rangers were trying to get that one back, Gus Markor scored on a play with Pete Langelle and Hank Goldup. Then Gordie Drillon raced from end to end to slide a neat shot under goalie Dave Kerr.

Before the second period ended, Rangers got one goal back through Bryan Hextall on a three-man rush with Phil Watson and Murray Patrick.

Drillon scored again early in the third period on a rush with Apps, and Rangers closing rush brought but one goal, by Alf Pike, Bill Al-lum, filling in on Rangers' defence for Art Coulter, who has a broken shoulder, earned an assist on Pike's goal.
