BISHOP PREACHES TO CROWDED CONGREGATIONS

Bishop Sir John Taylor Smith Delivered Four Most Eloquent And Pwerful Sermons Yesterday.—Expects To Sail For England On Wednesday.

His Lordship, Bishop Sir John Taylor Smith preached at the morning and evening services in St. Paul's Church to congregations which completely filled the building, that at the evening service being the largest, it is understood, that has ever attended the church. The rector, Rev. H. D. Raymond said both morning and evening greater. "But God said unto Him "Thou fool this night shall thy soul be required of thee." Such was the picture that the Master Artist painted.

In these days, much is said against rich men—often by those who would be rich themselves. But I find nothing in the Bible from Genesis to Revelation against rich men.

Today there are too many who are ready to "down tools" at the stroke of the clock—when five minutes more would finish the work in hand.

Now is there anything wrong in a man's inheriting riches. They are his only in trust, as it were and their power for good or ill depends on the way they are used.

But it is in the next sentence that the engine goes off the line—when he wishes for more room in which to bestow his goods. He should have passed his increase on to his brother.

We hear much talk today of the brotherhood of men. But remember this—there can be no brotherhood of man without the fatherhood of God!

On looking into the story we can see a picture of extreme selfishness—and who is more miserably than a selfish, Godless man?

The utmost limit of the vision of a Godless man is the last trench in the grave—but not so the man of God—these have a vision of the open heavens, of the commanding voice of their Lord saying: "This is My beloved son in Whom I am well pleased."

Shout—sighted—yes. He thought he could satisfy his immortal soul by that which is tangible and visible—"Soul thou hast much goods, laid up for many years"—not realizing that he was but a tenant at will—liable to die at any moment. I may not live to finish this sermon; you may not live to hear the end of it.

So we mark the perplexity, selfishness and short sightedness of this rich man—to whom the Lord said "This night shall thy soul be required of thee."

But one may say "Give us the positive side, sir, what does life consist of? Here is the answer: "It is life eternal, that they might know Thee, the only true God, and Jesus Christ whom thou has sent."

So we must open our hearts to God and let Him in. Not only driving out the darkness—but letting in the light. Not turning over a new leaf, but taking on a new life.

So "take heed and beware of covetousness for a man's life consisteth not in the abundance of the things that he possesseth."

At the evening service, Bishop Taylor Smith, took for the theme of his sermon, "Good Cheer." He referred to the fact that this was his last sermon in Canada as he was sailing for the Old Land on Wednesday.

Our Lord had always been a bringer of good cheer. He had fed the multitude, healed the sick, stilled the storm on the sea of Galilee and raised the dead.

Christmas was at hand—the season of good cheer. But all the banqueting and festivities which go with that day were useless, unless the presence of Christ was in the heart. He hoped his words would help this—the only real good cheer—to some of those present that night.

His Lordship also delivered eloquent and powerful addresses to a women's meeting, held in St. Paul's Church on Saturday afternoon, to a meeting for men only in the Church on Sunday afternoon, and to the young people of the city in the Y. M. C. A. hall, directly after the Sunday evening service. At all these services, the auditoriums were filled to capacity.

Maroons Defeat Maple Leafs

TORONTO, Dec. 4.—Despite the absence of Stewart and Munro from their line up, due to injuries and with only two available subs, the Montreal Maroons backed by Benedict's brilliant goal keeping and A. C. Lester's systematic defensive play, defeated the Toronto Maple Leafs, 2 goals to one in a tightly contested national league fixture at Arena Gardens on Saturday night.

Canadian Pacific Stock Advances

NEW YORK, Dec. 3.—A revival of bullish enthusiasm stimulated by reports that the Canadian Pacific Railway Company was about to divorce its interest in steamship, hotel and telegraph holdings in a way to benefit its shareholders swept the New York stock exchange today in another wave of excited trading, in which the number of shares sold crossed the three million mark for the third time this year, and for the sixth time in the history of the exchange.

Although Chairman Edward W. Beatty, K. C., of the Canadian Pacific denied that the company was "actively" considering such a proposal, the report served to direct attention of the speculators to the opportunity to "give a whirl" to the leading standard railway shares, with the result that they were sent skyrocketing upward with Canadian Pacific leading with an advance that one time amounted to seventeen points, part of which was subsequently lost on Mr. Beatty's statement.

However, the enthusiasm of the speculators was in no wise limited to railway shares and many of the prominent specialties were swept into the whirlpool of activity with the result that more than 715 issues were traded in in one of the wildest days seen on the New York stock exchange this year.

Foxes Shipped For Ranching Purposes

(Canadian Press)
MONTREAL, Dec. 3.—That Montreal has become a clearing house for black and silver fox shipments in Canada and also that the fox raising industry in the Dominion, is making rapid headway is shown by the movement by Canadian National Express today of nearly 350 of these highly prized breed beauties bound for destinations as widely separated as St. Cesaire, Quebec, and for points in Norway. Nor are these the only points brought out by the present fox shipments, these also demonstrate that while Prince Edward Island was the birthplace of the black fox industry and while that province supplied the original breeding stock, other provinces, notably Manitoba and Quebec, are now coming into the field as exporters of live stock for the establishment of fox ranches in other countries.

Shipments of breeding foxes from Prince Edward Island to Western Canada were made about three years ago when ranches were established in Manitoba. Today's Canadian National train from the west, carried ten foxes from the parent stock carried westward three years ago which are now consigned to Antwerp, Belgium, for the starting of a fox ranch there and as an illustration of the fact that these bluebloods travel with every care which Canadian National Express can give them.

It was announced that the foxes for Antwerp would go forward on the steamship special from here Saturday morning to catch the Penland of the Red Star Line sailing from Halifax. Yesterday's train from the Maritime Provinces also carried in express cars 33 foxes, consigned to Norway for establishment of breeding farms. As these are sailing from New York they were forwarded to that point by Canadian National Express tonight. In this lot were also about a hundred foxes for Watertown, Wis., and Fenton, Mich. The Quebec movement was a shipment of 150 foxes from Baie-St-Paul to Ste. Beatre for establishment of a ranch there.

Coolidge Demands "Adequate" Navy

(Special to the Guardian)
WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 3.—The "big navy" contingent has not won President Coolidge, nor have disarmament plans and peace proposals budged him. The president entrenched on his stand for an "adequate" navy it was learned at the White House today and feels that in order to keep naval protection in that category congress should authorize further cruiser construction immediately. Only eight cruisers have been constructed since Mr. Coolidge has been in the presidency and it was pointed out that new construction, repairs and replacements were regarded as necessary.

Proposals to abandon armaments receive no sympathy with the president who feels that the United States has a regular army that can be regarded in no other light than as a police force.
