DANES ORGANIZE TO HELP NEWCOMERS

WINNIPEG, Man., Dec. 4.—Aiming at organizing the 40,000 Danes living in the Dominion to assist newcomers from Denmark in being assimilated as citizens of this country and at the same time preserving Danish ideals and culture, the first convention of the League of Danes in Canada held here recently proved successful. It was attended by 100 natives of Denmark. An executive committee was appointed and the new society was formed under what those present regarded as exceptionally favorable circumstances. Dr. N. P. Olsen, Dominion veterinary officer, presided.

TO ORGANIZE RESIDENTIAL HOSTELS

LONDON, Eng., Dec. 5.—(By The Canadian Press) — A move is being made by the Overseas Settlement Department to organize residential hostels in various parts of the kingdom, where women will receive tuition in domestic management as a preliminary to their departure to domestic employment overseas. The training hostel opened last December by the Duchess of York at Market Harborough has proved a great success, and other hostels are now being organized for Scotland, Lancashire, Newcastle-on-Tyne, and Wales.

WITCHCRAFT BLAMED FOR BRUTAL SLAYING IN YORK, PHILADELPHIA

YORK, Pa., Dec. 4.—Witchcraft, that throwback to the middle ages, which still persists and is even growing in this section of Pennsylvania is blamed for what the police describe as "York County's most brutal murder."

Nelson D. Rehmyer, 59, described by some as a witch doctor, was beaten to death and an effort made to cremate his body, by three young men, one of whom is a confessed pow-wow doctor.

The three, Wilbert Hess, 18, John Currie, 16, and John Blymyre, 36, have admitted the killing of Rehmyer, while attempting to obtain a lock of his hair to break a "hex" said to have been placed on Hess and Blymyre by Rehmyer.

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Hon. R. B. Bennett Taking Hand in B. C. By Election

VICTORIA, B. C., Dec. 4.—The entrance into the campaign of Hon. R. B. Bennett, leader of the Conservative party in Canada, and of Premier S. F. Tolmie, of British Columbia, for the Conservatives and Hon. Charles Stewart, Federal Minister of the Interior for the Liberals, will mark the closing days of the Federal by-election campaign in Victoria, which will end with the polling on Thursday, December 6.

Hon. Mr. Bennett arrived in Vancouver this evening and after conferring with party leaders there will come to Victoria tomorrow morning. He will speak on behalf of D. D. Plunkett, the Conservative nominee.

Hon. S. F. Tolmie, whose resignation to take over the provincial premiership, caused the by-election, will be on the platform with Mr. Bennett and will make his first speech in the campaign.

Hon. Charles Stewart will speak in support of Hon. Dr. J. D. McLean, the Liberal candidate, on Wednesday evening. He will be the fourth Federal Minister to take part in the campaign.

The Liberal candidate has stressed the issues of port development and industry, while Mr. Plunkett has emphasized the Conservative tariff policy.
