Britain Calm And Confident

In a recent broadcast Canada's High Commissioner in Great Britain, Hon. Vincent Massey, gave ringing assurance of the faith that is in all British hearts in this time of crisis for civilization.

That is the spirit prevailing throughout the British Isles today. The Nazi attempt to foster rumors of a conflict within the British War Cabinet has backfired with a vengeance.

Certificates And Stamps

The Dominion Minister of Finance stresses the importance of the sale of war savings certificates and stamps in connection with Canada's war effort.

There are some thirteen thousand post offices where the certificates may be obtained, as well as 3,500 chartered banks, 500 investment dealers and 125 trust and loan companies.

New Values For Democracy

To the saving of the democratic order of government and of life, the dictators who at the moment think they have it by the throat may make a contribution for reasons thus stated in the current issue of the Yale Review by Prof. Carl Becker of Yale University:

Hitler and Stalin have at least done something to strengthen the cause of democracy. More than anything else in recent years, their incredible sophistries and ruthless brutalities have revealed to us the advantages of democratic institutions and the reality of the rational and humane values that are traditionally associated with them.

The peoples of other democratic countries look on with amazement, horror and alarm as the tide of savagery and bestiality rises, blotting out first one country and then another.

Greenland's value is strategic rather than commercial. A vast island with an area of 827,000 square miles and a population of only 15,000, of whom but 300 are Europeans, the country's trade has been a Danish state monopoly mostly furs, fish, whale oil, graphite and cryolite.
