Walker Outpoints Rock Malone In Milwaukee Bout

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Dec. 9.—Walker, world welter champion, defeated Jock Malone in a ten round boxing contest here tonight, winning nine out of ten, according to the majority of paper men at the ringside. Walker, the holder of the title, outpointed him from start. The fourth round was the best. He exchanged punches to the head in a thrilling rally in the centre of the ring. Mickey Hall way out with a short right cross. Walker set a furious pace in the eighth and ninth hooking left to body that slowed Malone up. Malone tried desperately but his punches lacked force. Walker in the tenth round, although he fought back desperately. The night's contest was the third of the pair.

THE MARKETS

(Canadian Press)
Bay Port.—The demand for grain showed no improvement and the market was quiet with car lots of Ontario No. 3 extra, Malting Barley quoted at \$1.06 and No. 3 grade at \$1.05 per bushel, extract, Ontario No. 2 white oats at 62 cents, and No. 4 grade at 59 cents per bushel, ex-store. Prices for spring wheat flour were firmly maintained at the recent advances noted, but the volume of business was small, the tone of the market for winter wheat flour was also firm, but the trade was quiet. There was no further developments in the condition of all lines of millfeed, but the undertone was strong at the recent advance. The volume of business in rolled oats was moderate and the trend steady. A strong feeling continues to prevail for eggs and the prospects are for higher price in the near future, owing to the small supplies coming forward and the steady decrease in stocks on spot. The butter market remains very quiet owing to the absence of any important demand from outside sources, but prices were unchanged. The improvement noted in the demand from English importers for cheese continues and with advance in prices bid and the increased strength in the foreign exchange situation. Exporters here have been in a position to accept most of the orders that still come forward and a good trade has resulted. On spot current receipts sold at 16 1/2 to 17 cts, per lb. Crop beans were still in good demand and prices were quoted at \$2.65 and \$2.75 per bushel.

"EGGS"
OTTAWA, Dec. 9.—There is some increase in the egg production, but the increase is largely on specialized poultry farms, where pullets are hatched early. At consuming centres more fresh eggs are arriving and prices are easier. Toronto fresh specials with extras are little easier with specials piling at 73, extras—70.—Montreal market higher.—Jobbing extras 65 to 70, firsts 50 to 55, other grades unchanged.—Winnipeg dealers paying delivered fresh extras 60, firsts 55, seconds 36 to 39. Saskatchewan movement of fresh eggs practically nil. Edmonton market continues steady with fresh eggs very scarce. Calgary market continues unchanged. Vancouver dealers paying 57 for extras and 55 for firsts.

Dominion Livestock
QUEBEC, Dec. 9.—There were 156 cattle, 892 sheep and lambs, 362 hogs and 470 calves offered for sale on the two markets this morning. The cattle were mostly made up of milkers left over from yesterday, with a few canners cutters and bulls on which there was no change in prices. Lambs were strong. The commonest kinds brought \$11.50 and prices ranged from that up to \$13.00. Sheep were sold in mixed lots at \$6.00 to \$6.35 and good sheep

For the first time in his career extending over fourteen years of fighting in nearly every country on the globe, Smith was knocked down when he sank to the canvas in the twelfth round before wicked left punches to the ribs.

SPORT WRITER SAYS AWARD WAS A GIFT

Claims That Renault Won Nine Out of the Ten Rounds Against Rojas

The Montreal Star's Boston correspondent says:

Referee Joe O'Connor handed Romoé Rojas his Christmas gift in the form of a decision over Jack Renault in their ten round bout in Mechanics' Hall, last night. Renault, after winning nine out of the ten rounds by a comfortable lead in every one but the fourth, in which Rojas had a slight shade, was adjudged a loser in one of the weirdest decisions ever rendered in a Boston ring.

There was nothing wrong with the fight until Referee O'Connor, for some unaccountable reason, began to antagonize Renault. The latter fought the best he knew how, and while it was hardly of a championship calibre, was far better than what Rojas presented.

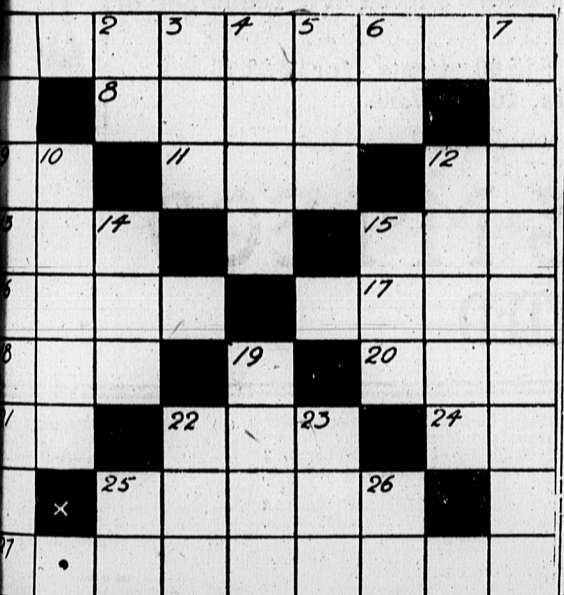

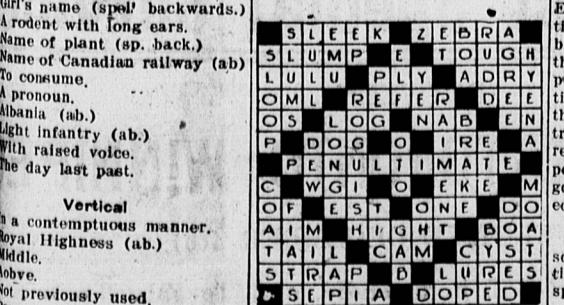
