JAMES H. MORSON

James H. Morson, one of Brookline's best known residents, died Tuesday at his home on 35 Gorham Avenue, Brookline, Mass., in his seventy-fifth year. He had been in poor health for some time. A native of Prince Edward Island, Mr. Morson was graduated from the University of Maine with Phi Beta Kappa honors in 1900 and received his L.L. B. degree there in 1903. He was also a graduate of Prince of Wales College, Charlottetown, 1892. He had since practiced before the Massachusetts, Maine and Federal bars with offices in Boston and was senior member of the firm of Morson and Saklad, specializing in estates and corporations and being noted for his scholarly briefs in these fields.

He was a member of the American, Massachusetts, Norfolk County and Boston Bar Associations and the American Judicature and Massachusetts Law societies, a past president and former secretary and treasurer of the Canadian Club of Boston and a member of Bethshon Lodge of Masons, the Men's Club of the First Presbyterian Church and the Boston City Club. Surviving are a widow, also one brother and three sisters.
