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ARMISTICE NEGOTIATIONS HAVE BEEN BROKEN OFF

Polish Delegates Returned from Conference. Must Now Seek Peace. Conflicting Reports Regarding Battles.

(Special to The Guardian.) PARIS, Aug. 3.—Armistice negotiations between Poles and Bolsheviks have been broken off and Polish delegates are returning to Warsaw, according to Foreign Office advices today.

Germany would rather remain out of the League of Nations altogether than enter it as entente constabulary to be used against Russia, Dr. Vons Simons, Foreign Minister declared, in a speech in the Reichstag.

A number of industries have been closed down in Eastern Canada, including the large pulp mills in Bathurst, N. B. for lack of fuel.

NOTABLE VISITOR TO P. E. ISLAND

Mr. W. M. Brittain, Member of the Peace Conference in Connection with Shipping Is Visiting the Glenaladale Settlement

Mr. W. M. Brittain, General Manager of the Export and Import Board of Trade, Baltimore, Md., is among visitors to Charlottetown, P. E. Island, on a mission of the commission on shipping at the Economic Council in Europe. During the four months of his stay in that country, he found opportunity to go to Scotland where he gathered quite a lot of valuable data in connection with the history of the MacDonal family, and of which family Mr. Brittain is connected.

He was about to make his contemplated visit here, and would furnish him with some interesting information which he had acquired in Scotland in regard to the early history of the Glenaladale family. He had not heard of the death of Judge MacDonald and it came to him as a shock when he arrived here yesterday to learn that his friend had passed away. Mr. Brittain will leave today for Tracadie in company with Rev. W. V. MacDonald in order to visit the place made historic by the landing of Captain John MacDonald. He will spend a couple of days on the island. After that he will visit Quebec and Montreal. Though an American citizen, Mr. Brittain has the unique distinction of being the son of a Canadian, the husband of a Canadian and the father of a Canadian. He had the pleasure of meeting Prince Edward Islanders on various occasions, notably the daughters of Capt. Finlayson of this city, who reside in New York, and the late Lieut. Guy McKenzie of this city of whom he cherishes pleasant memories, having met him aboard ship.

Day of Mourning For the Turks

(Special to The Guardian.) CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 3.—The Turkish newspapers announce, that the day when the Treaty is signed, will be observed by the Turks generally as a day of mourning. The shops and cafes will be closed as one of the signs of protest. It has not been possible, however, for definite arrangements to be made for the demonstration, as there is a lack of knowledge as yet of the exact date for the signing of the pact.

The defeat of Poland is the most portentous thing which has happened in Europe since the fourth army broke the Hindenburg line and the Russian steam roller moved into the hands of desperate men threatens to flatten out Poland, and is a menace to the whole continent. 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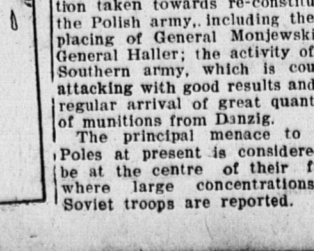
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THE WEATHER, TEMPERATURE, TIDE, MOON ETC.

League of Nations November 1

(Dom. Press Special.) LONDON, August 3.—The League of Nations Council meeting at San Sebastian, Spain, has decided to call a meeting of the League Assembly in Geneva on November 1, an exchange telegraph said today.

Communists Take Charge of Zittau

(Dom. Press Special.) LONDON, August 3.—Zittau, in Saxony, is in the hands of the Communist "Committee of Fifteen" who have demanded that the police withdraw, a Berlin dispatch to the London Times said today.

Closure in House of Commons

(Dom. Press Special.) LONDON, August 3.—Gullotine or closure measures will be applied to 2,200 outstanding votes before committees of the Commons. Hundreds of millions of pounds will be voted without discussion. Thirty divisions are threatened.

France Optimistic

PARIS, August 3.—The military experts here were still inclined today to view the situation in Poland optimistically. The reports they received indicated that the Soviet cavalry had not advanced further than yesterday's advices indicated, being still about seventy miles from Warsaw.
