Mr. Mayhew said he did not wish to elaborate on his statement at this time but the industry would not be overlooked and the fishermen are not going to be ruined at all. He said about 200,000 cases of "chum salmon" had been left on the industry's hands but "what they are concerned about now is the 1949 pack."

The Minister earlier told D. King Hazen (PC—St. John-Albert) that steps are being taken to try to increase the stocks of Atlantic salmon. Several other Maritime members took part in the debate, bringing in Atlantic fishing problems.

Mr. Mayhew protested several times against detailed questions when the House was considering supplementary estimates for the fiscal year which ended last March 31. The time for such complex debate, he said, is when the estimates for the new fiscal year come up and full statements can be made. However, the discussion of fish of numerous varieties as well as bait problems occupied the chamber until near adjournment of the afternoon session.

Strike At Asbestos

The chamber moved into further study of the estimates after three C. G. F. members called on the Federal Government to intervene in a mine strike at Asbestos, Que. The protests of Clarie Gillis (CCF—Cape Breton South), Ross Thatcher (CCF—Moose Jaw) and Angus MacInnis (CCF—Vancouver East) against the actions of the Quebec Government were joined by Joseph Lafontaine (L—Mégantic-Frontenac) who termed them dictatorial.

During the fisheries debate, A. J. Brooks (PC—Royal) supported Mr. Hazen in his demands for Atlantic salmon conservation and urged there was need for conservation of other fish as well in New Brunswick waters. Herring, for example, had been depleted until they were getting seriously scarce.

Another "serious" problem was the rule which allowed American druggers to come in within three or four miles of the coast while Canadian craft had to stay 12 miles out.

Mr. Mayhew said work was progressing on the herring problem and "I think we can give a good report."

W Chester S. McLure (PC—Queens) asked for information on the movement of frozen herring from British Columbia to the Atlantic coast for use as bait.

Mr. Mayhew said there was a shortage of bait on the Atlantic coast. The price trade had arranged for the shipment of bait to the Atlantic coast. The government had agreed to pay the freight charges.

George Nowlan (P C — Digby-Annapolis-King's) said movement of the bait indicated something was radically wrong with the fishing industry on the Atlantic when it had to go to the west coast for bait.

Use Of Seiners

Mr. Nowlan said the disappearance of the bait coincided with the use of seiners in the Annapolis Basin. The Department claimed the use of seiners had nothing to do with the shortage of bait. However, he urged that the seiners be prohibited from operating in the basin. If the situation did not improve then it would be clear that the seiners were not to blame.

Wesley Stewart (L—Charlotte) said that since December, 1948, sardines in his constituency have been very scarce. There had been good crops in 1947 and in most of 1948. He said he was not prepared to argue whether or not seiners were to blame for ups and downs in the stocks of fish.

Maj.-Gen. G. R. Pearkes (PC—Nanaimo) said it was alright for British Columbia to send surplus bait to the Atlantic coast but it should not be done at the expense

Let Contract For Erection of New Pier

OTTAWA, April 4 — (CP) — E. G. M. Cape and Company's tender of \$2,029,119.76 was the lowest of five bids for construction of a new pier — No. 3 — in Halifax, opened today by the National Harbours Board.

A concrete structure 750 feet long and 260 feet wide, with 115,000 square feet of floor space, it will replace the old wooden landing alongside pier three through which most of Canada's overseas forces passed going and coming during the First Great War.

Longshoremen Balk At Crossing Picket Line

VANCOUVER, April 4 — (CP) — Longshoremen refused today to cross a picket line of the Canadian Seamen's Union (C.L.C.) at LaPointe Pier to load the strike-bound cargo vessel Riverside.

The C. S. U. called the strike against east-coast operators Wednesday after owners signed an agreement with the rival seafarers' International Union (A.F.L.). The Riverside is eastern-owned.

Pickets at the pier said the International Longshoremen and Warehousemen's Union (C.C.L.-C.I.O.) agreed not to cross the picket line. In Victoria, another eastern-owned vessel, the Seaboard Queen, also is strike-bound. A third vessel operated from the Atlantic is due in Victoria today and a fourth expected in Vancouver Wednesday.

The C.S.U.'s west coast vice-president, James Thompson, said all eastern-owned ships stopping in British Columbia ports would be tied up for the duration of the strike.
