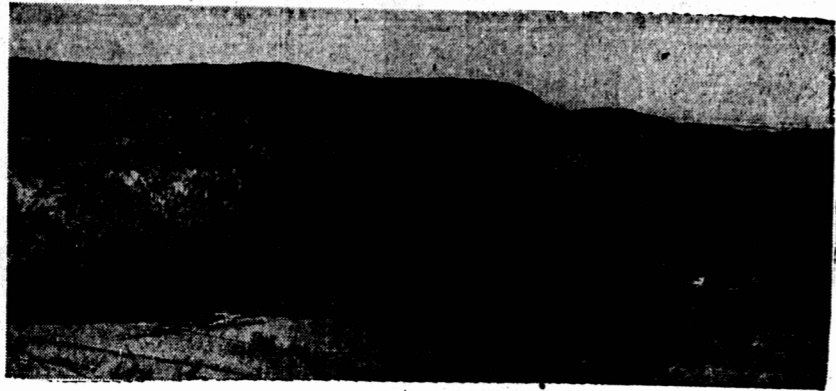
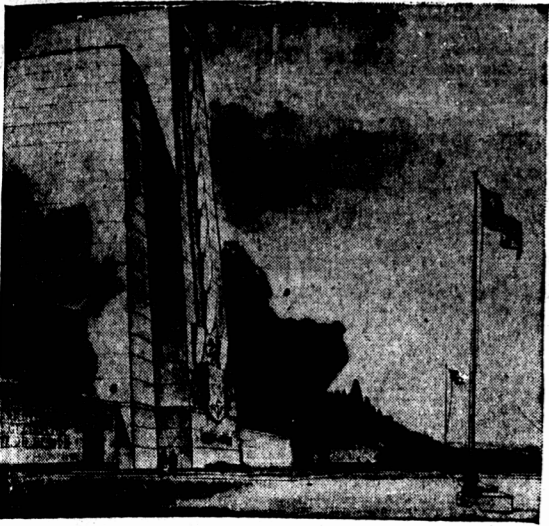


GREAT NATURAL SHRINE IN GATINEAU HILLS TO COMMEMORATE CANADA'S WAR HEROES

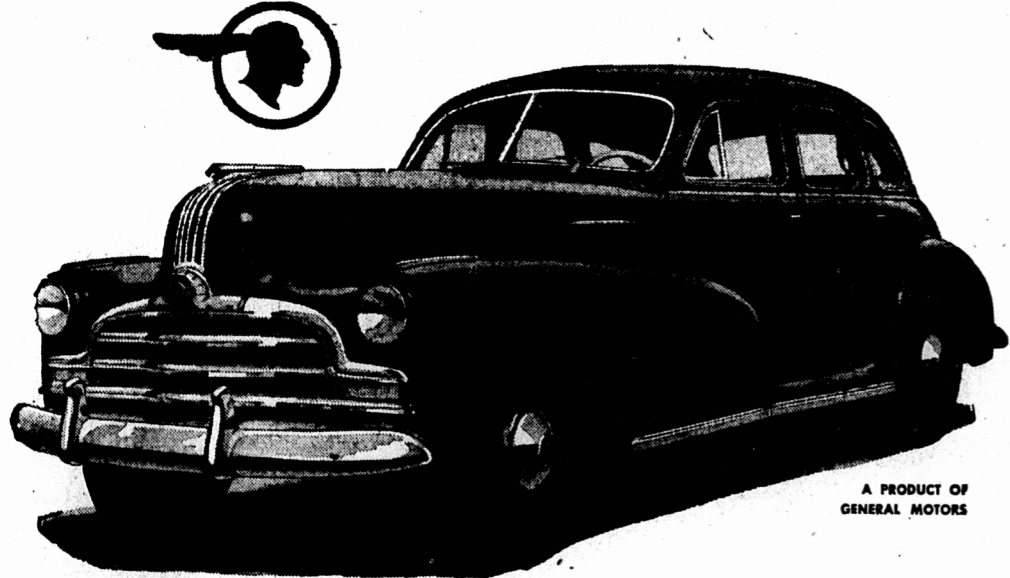
