Ottawa Senators Capture World Hockey Title

VANCOUVER, B.C., April 4.—Ottawa Senators hold the world's championship trophy they fought their way through three playoffs to the honor which they carried off any team ever did.

The 7,000 fans who turned out to see what proved the final game, expressed their admiration for the fighting spirit which animated the Senators. At no time during the game with Vancouver or Edmonton were the easterners at their full strength.

The Senators triumphed over the best the west has produced this season and they deserved their victory. It was a battle of speed and brilliant attack against experience, a heady calculation in every play and grim determination, and the latter won.

Last night's game was singularly even throughout, although eight penalties were handed out by Referee Len. They were all two-minute ones. Each team received four penalties. One of Ottawa's penalties was given to Benedict. Gagne and Ambour proved themselves fast and tricky players. There is no denying the fact that Ottawa possesses a wonderful team and one which they ought to cherish.

The crowd was about evenly divided between their desire to see the westerners triumph and their admiration for the grit of the Senators. The work of Simpson, Trapp and Winkler on defence was very fine. In last night's game Ottawa secured twenty-one shots. The work of Simpson, Trapp and Winkler in the first period, fourteen in the second, and fifteen in the three periods, proved somewhat disappointing on the series play. Morrison who substituted for him, showing great interest in the game, weighed the westerners and used their weight with telling effect in body checking.
