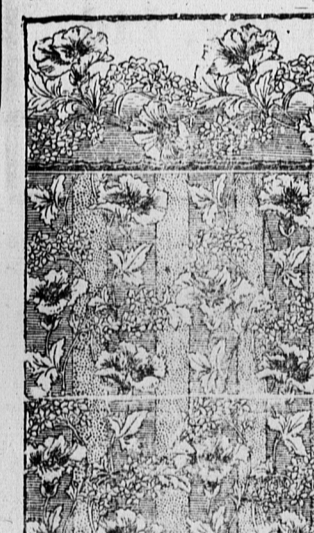

THE LATE MR. W. L. COTTON

It is with feelings of more than ordinary regret that we record the death of Mr. W. L. Cotton, the veteran journalist and member of our editorial staff.

William Lawson Cotton was in his eightieth year, being born in New London on July 23, 1848, and over sixty of these were spent in journalism.

The two young men struck up a friendship then which lasted through the vicissitudes of life and politics to the end, and none will be more sorry to learn of Mr. Cotton's demise than the Hon. W. S. Fielding now in retirement at Ottawa.

Mr. Cotton returned to Charlottetown to undertake the editorship and management of the Examiner, the proprietorship of which he subsequently acquired and organized a company to float it as an evening daily in 1877.

For the long period of 49 years he remained in harness as Editor, and only retired in 1922, when the Examiner was absorbed by the Guardian. Even then he did not lay down his pen.

He pursued what he considered was the right course on the particular issues, but if these received the endorsement of the party, in spite of his opposition, he loyally fell into line and continued his unwavering support of the party of the National Policy.

Mr. Cotton was a life long member of St. Peter's Cathedral, and an important lay officer of which he had held. He was a familiar figure in Diocesan Council meetings, and in the congregation on the various wards of the Church.

He was greatly missed in Anglican Church circles. He also took a great interest in social questions, particularly in the care and upbringing of wayward and neglected children. For years he was the treasurer of the Children's Society, and it is not

too much to say that it was largely due to the publicity which he gave its work and proceedings, that it was kept active and received the measure of support it has done.

Mr. Cotton was happily married in 1874, to Miss Margaret Ellen Harris, daughter of Mr. W. C. Harris, who survives, and sister of the distinguished artist Mr. Robert Harris, C. M. G., the painter of the Fathers of Confederation. No more devoted pair walked the streets of Charlottetown during the past 54 years; they were inseparable, and were present at, he taking active part in, nearly all functions tending to benefit the public welfare.

There were seven children of the union and all lived to bring credit and honor to their parents, viz: Mr. Frank C. Cotton of Cape Breton, who came home to visit his parents; Winnifred, Mrs. W. E. Hyndman; Rev. Walter C. Cotton, South Rhodesia; Robert L. May, Mrs. T. E. McNutt; Miss Margaret and Mr. William E. all of Charlottetown, to each and all of whom the Guardian extends its sympathy in their great loss.

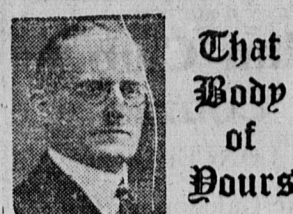
TO accept the verdict after an election does not mean that the minority have been converted to the views of the temporary majority—far from it.

A POSSIBLE CAUSE OF MIGRAINE

I have written more than once about that miserable form of headache called migraine, which is a sort of neuralgia of one side or one half of the head, accompanied by nausea, vomiting, and great depression.

Between attacks patients usually have a fair degree of health. Just what causes it has never been definitely proven. That overwork and worry seem to predispose to the attacks is generally admitted. Further, that the liver was a factor has been suspected for many years because of the "bilious" feeling that usually accompanies the headache.

In order to try and fix the blame definitely upon the liver, Dr. J. S. Diamond of New York investigated thirty five cases of migraine with the usual half-sided headache and abdominal symptoms. He made liver tests in all these cases, which as you know consists of testing out the ability of the liver to store sugar within itself, instead of allowing too much to circulate in the blood.

Where the liver took too long to separate out the dye and store the sugar, it was thus proven that the liver was not doing its work properly. In 32 of the 35 cases it was found that the liver was taking too long in doing this work.

Now meats and eggs are good foods, and most of us should eat them at least once a day, particularly if we do physical work or take exercise, but where the system does not tolerate them well, then only after the individual is well rested should meat or eggs be eaten. The above would certainly tend to prove that the liver in these individuals, by not doing its work, causes migraine.
