The chapel, so-called, now in process of construction at Williams College, Williamston, Mass. as the gift of Mrs. Frederick Ferris Thompson of New York, in memory of her husband, will be the handsomest building of the kind in this country. Its cost, as estimated, will be upwards of \$300,000. The plans, prepared by Francis R. Allen and Charles Collins, architects, Boston, are of the most elaborate character, and all of the appointments are to be in perfect keeping. A contract was made with the Meneely Bell company of Troy for a chime of ten bells for the grand tower of this chapel, it being stipulated that neither skill nor expense should be spared in securing a superior set of bells. These bells will be similar to the ones furnished by this company for the chimes of St. Pauls church in this city.

By the courtesy of the Charlottetown Guardian The Times is enabled today to present its readers with a portrait of Rev J W McConnell, who succeeds Rev G W Fisher in the pastorate of the Central Methodist church. Mr McConnell arrived in the city yesterday afternoon from Charlottetown with his wife and one little daughter, his other three children remaining on the Island for a few days.—The new pastor of Central Methodist was born in St. John, where he lived up to the time he went to College. He was educated at Mount Allison University, from which he graduated in 1891. Mr. McConnell was ordained in Moncton at the conference meeting in Moncton in 1892. As a probationer he labored on the Gilson and Campbellton circuits. After his ordination he was stationed at Harcourt and then at Vernon River, P. E. I. The last four years he has been pastor of Grace church, Charlottetown. Mr. McConnell is regarded as one of the able young ministers of the N. B. and P. E. I. Methodist conference and comes to the Central church in response to the unanimous invitation of the congregation. He will preach at both services in the Central church tomorrow. The Times joins with others in welcoming Mr. McConnell and family to Moncton.—Moncton Times.
