Schools Re-open Next Week

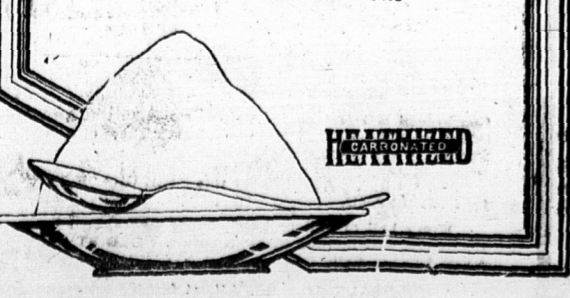

PETER FARRIN, A GREAT HORSE

Peter Farrin, 2:07 1/2, one time champion of Lower Canada, died last week following a rupture. He was owned by John Carroll of Sherbrooke, N. B. Peter Farrin, formerly a member of the Thomas W. Murphy stable at Chatham equalled the Maritime record of 2:10 1/2, made twelve years previously by Gloria. A year later at Chatham he further reduced the Maritime record for stallions to 2:08 1/2.

In 1920, also at Chatham, he further lowered the Maritime record to 2:08 1/2, as well as pacing three fastest heats ever paced up to that time over a provincial track, 2:09 1/2, 2:08 1/2, 2:13, Fern Hal winning the first heat in 2:12 3/4. These were the days before John R. Braden of Maine. Not only in Saint John, but throughout the province generally the death of Peter Farrin will awaken many recollections of the achievements of the gallant little horse, especially in Chatham, where his record-breaking performances served to give widespread recognition to the excellence of the North Shore track. Peter Farrin was a real race horse.
