These late August days with their evidences of harvest fields and fruit-laden trees, bring regretfully to mind the fact that Summer's glorious reign is drawing to a close. Throughout the length and breadth of our favored Province the farms now present busy and picturesque scenes, and husbandmen are industriously gathering in the abundance of their ripened fields.

On the whole the outlook is satisfactory. Although in certain sections there has been a falling off in the yield of certain crops, owing to unfavorable weather in the Spring, and later to insect pests, the output will be a good average on the whole—and prices will probably rule high.

Our agriculturists have had much to contend with, and success in their business depends much upon hard work. Those who have been troubled with less drawbacks in their farming operations than some of their neighbors, have much to be thankful for.

This is the time of the year when Prince Edward Island looks well its part as a prosperous agricultural country. In driving through the province one is impressed by the landscape; the grain stacked in the stubble fields; the hay stacked and stored for winter's use; the ripening fruit bending down the branches of the trees which cluster protectively around the cozy farmhouses; the sleek and well fed cattle grazing in nourishing pastures all that makes a picture of which we should be proud.

On every side begin to be seen the signs of coming Autumn. On the roadsides and in waste places of the fields the golden rod glows like a sunset spread upon the earth; the birds sing not at all but show a disposition to gather together and consider their winter trip; the very scent in the air is of ripened grain and grasses.

Soon will come Harvest Home and Thanksgiving. The thoughtful man and woman will consider these things and feel that there is much for which to thank the Giver of all good.

A little later there will be a period of relaxation and pleasure when the cares that fill the day will be laid aside and the attractions of the Exhibition and horse races will gather together our people from every part of the Province and provide them with a program both instructive and enjoyable. This year the awards to competitors in all classes of agricultural effort have been apportioned on a liberal and encouraging scale, and Exhibition week promises to surpass all previous endeavors.

PYTHIANS IN ANNUAL SESSION

St. John's, August 29.—The twentieth annual convention of the Grand Lodge Knights of Pythias of the maritime provinces opened yesterday in the K. of P. headquarters in Germain street.

It is estimated that about 200 visitors are in the city to attend the proceedings of the K. of P. grand body. Some thirty members of the "order" arrived from Moncton on the early train yesterday, bringing with them the Citizen's Band of the railway town.

Following the opening ceremonies the reports of the various standing committees were taken up.

The following past chancellors were then introduced and given the grand lodge rank: W. C. Bowden, C. T. Jones, R. M. Bartsch, St. John; D. A. McBeth, Moncton; E. C. Thomas, St. Stephen; W. B. Wilson, Alex. McKenzie, Amherst; H. A. Porter, Halifax; John P. Trahey, Parrsboro; S. J. Soley, W. W. Hatfield, Port Grenville; John L. Godkin, Charlottetown; H. Chase Frank Wilson, Truro; Andrew Roy, J. J. Dooley, Westville; Wm. D. Chisholm, New Glasgow; J. J. Brooks, C. C. Rogers, Perth.

The Supreme Chancellor was then admitted and introduced to the members of the grand lodge. He was accompanied by Supreme Representatives F. A. Goldsoe and Le B. Wilson and Past Supreme Representatives James Moulson and W. C. H. Gritmaker, and Supreme Representative Power, Quebec.

The head of the order was received with supreme honors and then addressed the assembled knights. He delivered a very eloquent speech, dealing with the fraternal relations between Americans and Canadians, speaking of the greatness of Canada, and dealing at length with Pythianism and its growth. He exemplified the secret work of the order.

At 1:30 o'clock the annual meeting of the First Regt. of the maritime provinces was held. Colonel F. Parker Gritmaker of St. Stephen presided. There were also present Major J. P. Wry, of St. Stephen, Adjutant Alfred Dodge, Quartermaster F. A. Goldsoe, Capt. McLeod of New Glasgow and officers of the various companies. Reports were read from various officers and routine business transacted.

Vegetarians will find in the September DELICATOR a recipe for vegetable curry, given by Swami Abhedananda, leader of the New York Vedanta Society. He first fries his vegetables separately in oil until they are a little more than half cooked. He then sets them aside and fries in oil, also, cloves, cardamom seeds, bay leaf, finely chopped chili peppers, etc. He then dissolves the curry powder in salted water, after which he mixes the ingredients together adding the curry last. The entire mixture is then placed in a tightly covered pan to cook gently over a slow fire until all of the vegetables become tender.

A. O. H. IN SESSION AT HALIFAX

HALIFAX, Aug. 29.—The Provincial Convention of the A. O. H. opened at two o'clock yesterday afternoon in the A. O. H. Hall on Hollis Street. There was a large attendance, Mr. John Morrissy, Provincial President of Newcastle, occupied the chair on the stage with him were Rev. Father Crumley, of Chatham, N. B., and Rev. Fathers M. Manus and Sweet, of Halifax. The report of the Provincial President was read and referred to a committee. It was an interesting report and dealt in a complete and concise manner with the work of the Order. Mr. Morrissy referred to the San Francisco disaster, and the suffering undergone by some of the members of the Order in that place, and how their call for help had been heard and answered by Hibernians the world over. Reference was made to the death of the great Irish patriot, Michael Davitt and to the death of James J. O'Donnell, the efficient secretary of the Nova Scotia Order. It was also suggested that a system of life insurance for the members would be originated, and a movement was in contemplation to have the Prince Edward Island A. O. H. affiliate with the Provincial Convention. The address in concluding paid a high tribute to Canada and Canadians, and spoke of the great part that Irishmen are playing in the up-building of the Dominion, strong in faith, and ever thoughtful of the motherland.

The financial report showed the Order to be in a good condition. Various committees to draw up resolutions were appointed. A message was sent to Pope Pius as follows: "New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, Provincial Convention, Ancient Order of Hibernians, in session at Halifax, N. S., express to Your Holiness sincere love and devotion.
