

Memorial Athletic Field Officially Opened

Interscholastic Track & Field Meet Saturday Is Highly Successful

Dedicated to Island athletes who paid the supreme sacrifice in the past two wars the Memorial Athletic Field was officially opened by His Honor Lieutenant Governor J. A. Bernard Saturday afternoon when a great program of interscholastic track and field events plus other field events was held at the new stadium. The program was highly successful and the school athletes participating in the school program and showing decided promise of future track and field greatness.

There were no records broken but the 147 athletes representing many schools, came through with some stirring competition and fast times in each division that drew praise from the horde of former Island greats in attendance at the event, the first of its kind held here in good many years.

In his dedication remarks Governor Bernard paid stirring tribute to former Island athletes and a minute's silence was observed in their memory.

Appropriate remarks were also made by Honorable J. Walter Jones, Premier, His Worship Mayor E. B. MacMillan, O.B.E., Leader of the Opposition, George Walters, husky Abbeles field man captured the Hawley Crockett Trophy as the best senior all-around athlete, piling up a total of 20 points, included in which were first places in the shot put and javelin throw. In the latter event Walters hurled the sphere over 144 feet to best by a foot the mark set at the recent Maritime track and field championships.

Walter LePage, fleet footed sprint star of the Abegweit school runner-up spot with 19 points. LePage ran the century in

10 1/5 seconds and won the 220 yard dash. He had second place in the javelin throw, running broad and hop, step and jump.

Bill Brawley, R.C.A.F. star from Summerside gave an outstanding display of jumping ability as he captured first place in the high jump, running broad, and hop, step and jump, leaping a distance of 42 feet 4 inches in the latter event.

Blonde haired Bobby Jay of Summerside gave a stellar performance in the intermediate events, winning four events and placing third in another. Jay won the 100, 220, quarter and broad jump from stiff competition and managed to place third in the high jump to chalk up his 21-point total and capture the Department of Physical Fitness trophy.

In second place was Jack Nicholson of Queen Square School, a coming middle distance man, with victories in the 800 and mile run for a ten-point total.

Top performer in the junior events which were staged in the morning was Laird McLennan of West Kent School with seven points, followed by K. Beaton, also of West Kent, and Burke and Drew of Queen Square, with six apiece.

Team totals went to the Abegweits in the open events with 70 points, Queen Square in the intermediate division with 22 and West Kent in the juniors with a total of 17.

During noon hour out-of-town athletes were provided with sandwiches and pop by the Department of Physical Fitness.

"Big Boy" Peterson puts his Island heavyweight title on the block at the Forum tonight when he meets Jim Jenkins in a 10-round scrap that is creating a lot of interest among fight followers throughout the Province.

Reason for the intense interest is the fact that in a previous encounter this same pair of willing leather pushers battled to a draw in a rough, mauling encounter and both came out of the scrap with the feeling that they had been more or less "robbed." Since that time the same feeling has persisted and tonight both youngsters will attempt to settle the matter once and for all.

It should be a whale of a scrap. Both willing mixers and able to hand it out and take it, there shouldn't be a dull moment from the opening bell on and the cash customers should witness a thrilling struggle all the way in the heavy going that is expected to develop.

It is likely that Peterson will enter the ring a slight favorite over his opponent but the dopesters' way of figuring will mean little to each other once they start tossing leather in each other's direction and that should be somewhere around 10 p.m. tonight.

The popular Bud Lund, one of the most crowd pleasing fighters to appear on the fight horizon in some time, meets smooth boxing contender C.P. Archer announced last night. It will be a 12-round battle with the winner being recognized by the Canadian Boxing Federation as the rightful titleholder.

Abegweits Even Up Baseball Series With Summerside

In a tense, close-knit nine inning struggle in the Abegweits yesterday afternoon forced a sixth and deciding game for the Island baseball title when they defeated Summerside All Stars 3-2. It was the fifth game of the series and the result left both squads with two victories and a tie to show for their efforts.

And it was the strong right arm of big Elmer Larter plus the defensive brilliance of Buck Whitlock and the stick work of Ted Strain and Charlie Ryan that turned the tide in favor of the Islanders.

Larter, toiling the last three innings with a sore shoulder yielded but six scattered blows over the nine inning route being invincible in the pinches. Whitlock with the bat in the seventh and one out made a leaping one handed stab at short of a hard hit liner to force a twin killing while Ted Strain and Charlie Ryan were front in the seventh with Strain and Elmer Larter riding the sacks. Ryan poked a looping single out over second to knock in the winning run in the top of the ninth.

They were the highlights of a game that kept the largest crowd of fans in years in a high state of excitement throughout the struggle between the two evenly matched squads. Bernard starting again for the Summerside team came through with another magnificent performance but it was the courageous figure of Larter who had the better of the flinching duel yesterday. In trouble in this late inning and again in the ninth he pitched his way out of the tough spots and richly deserved his victory.

Playing scoreless ball for the first two innings, Summerside opened the scoring in the first of the third when G. Bernard was safe on an error at second. He went to second on S. Bernard's sacrifice and scored on Larter's line single to left.

Abbeles came back in the bottom of the fourth with two counters. Goodwin and Whitlock were both safe on errors; Vernie Larter sacrificed them along with a well placed bunt; Williams popped out to the catcher to make it two a way but Strain came through with his double to chase both runners across the plate.

Abbeles struck again in the seventh for a 3-1 lead, Strain drew a pass and then stole second as Gallant was striking out. Elmer Larter got
