SAILS TWO MILES ABOVE THE EARTH

New York Balloonist Gives Successful Test of His New Air Ship

NORTH ADAMS, Mass., May 13.—Following the christening of his new balloon, the Conqueror, by his daughter, Miss Natalie and in the presence of his wife and about six thousand spectators, A. Holland Forbes, of New York, made a flight, the initial one for his balloon of about seventy miles in an air line from this city at Canton Centre, Conn., after having been in the air for five hours and forty minutes.
 Mr. Forbes, who piloted his own balloon, his first trip as a licensed pilot under the rules of the Aero Club of America, was accompanied by Leo Stevens, builder of the balloon, and W. F. and H. J. Whitehouse, all of New York. The balloon carried eighteen hundred pounds of sand ballast.
 Mr. Forbes declared the trip the longest he had ever undertaken, and Mr. Stevens said it was the coldest in his experience of many ascensions. At one time the balloon attained an altitude of more than two miles it being sent up to that height in the hope of finding a steady current of wind.
 Much of the time they were above the clouds, and at the highest altitudes the aeronauts found it bitterly cold. More than half of the time practically all of the last portion of the trip, they were above the clouds, and had no view of the earth except in momentary glimpses. At one time they witnessed a beautiful rainbow effect upon the clouds.

TWO WATERS FROM ONE WELL
LOGAN'S PARK, Ind., May 13.—Two kinds of water flowing from the same well are to be found at River-side Park. An eight-inch pipe is sunk into the ground for a distance of eighty feet, and inside this is a five-inch pipe, which is carried down somewhat farther. Fresh water from the limestone stratum comes up between the two pipes, while water which tastes and smells strongly of hydrogen sulphide comes up through the five-inch pipe from a lower stratum. The sulphur water flows at the rate of a gallon a minute from the drinking fountain over the well, while the fresh water flows with smaller volume from a pipe about twenty feet distant.

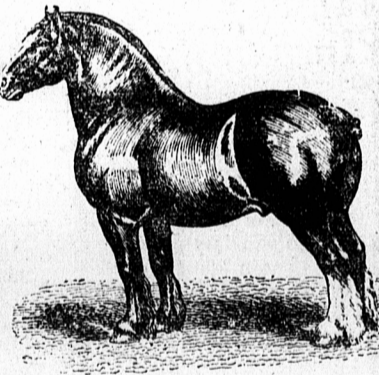
