OVER THREE HUNDRED AND FIFTY CLAIMS ON EMPRESS FUND.

LONDON, Oct. 5.—Over three hundred and fifty claims on the Mansion House fund for the sufferers by the Empress of Ireland disaster were received up to September 30th, which was fixed as the date for filing such claims, but owing to the difficulties created by the war, the date has been extended slightly for Overseas applicants. Of these claims nearly 150 were by dependents of the crew, and nearly 850 by dependents of passengers, although in each class some applications cover several dependents. The cases enumerated are only those originating on this side, and the Canadian claims have not yet been completed by the High Commissioner's office.

Certain German claims will now be ignored, while other claims from survivors are only being entertained where health has been shattered. One claim comes from relatives of a family in which the father, mother, two sisters, three brothers and a son-in-law all perished.

The total amount of the fund paid into the public trustee is over \$450,000; the Lord Mayor's fund \$350,000; the Montreal Citizens fund, \$50,000. The public trustee is now engaged in framing a scheme of disbursement, which is expected to be ready at the end of the year, on lines similar to that employed in the case of the Titanic fund. The fund will be so invested as to automatically cease to exist with the death of the last dependent.

The claimants on this side will receive weekly allowances, but the Canadian claims, which are few, will be met by the payment of lump sums through the High Commissioner's office. The Salvation Army sufferers have individually made few claims in comparison with the large numbers of members lost, as the Salvation Army took charge of all claims of direct characters.

BREAKING CAMP AT VALCARTIER

VALCARTIER, Oct. 7.—Although the men of the contingent have moved away and the population has fallen from 33,000 to 400 odd, a lot of work is being done here and will continue to afford occupation for another fortnight. Thousands of tents have to be struck and packed and returned to the military stores, blankets have to be baled and returned, stoves must be taken down, incinerators must be taken from the main camp and taken back. To do this work there remains in camp the Divisional Train Canadian Army Service Company. This organization was first to reach Valcartier and will be the last to leave. The train consists of four companies, No. 3, Kingston; Major Mitchell; No. 4, Montreal; Major Matthews; No. 5, Sherbrooke; Major Keating; and No. 10, Quebec; Major Leonard.

The Quebec Company was first to reach Valcartier, arriving there on afternoon of August 14. On the same night when the garrison was being reviewed in Montreal in a downpour of rain, No. 4 Company pulled out and entrained for Valcartier where they have been ever since.

While there has been very little glory in the work of the Divisional Train their services have been of the greatest value and as one result the great number who have been in Valcartier are well trained and fit for any work in the handling of transport and the care of supplies. These men have had a lot of hard work, the transport and supply men being turned out at 4.30 every morning, a parade of some seventy-five wagons being lined up to take the supplies to the various battalions.

The officers in charge of the organization are Lieut. Col. G. P. Murphy, Ottawa, assistant director of supplies and transport; Lt. Col. Guay, Quebec, supply officer; Major Matthews, Montreal, senior transport officer; Major Derosiers, Montreal; Captain Wood, Ottawa, assistant supply officers.

GERMAN AEROPLANE BROUGHT DOWN.

PARIS, Oct. 7.—The French are reported to have brought down a German aeroplane flying over Romilly-Sur-Seine, 23 miles North-west of Troyes.

ASIATIC CHOLERA BREAKS OUT.

LONDON, Oct. 7.—Rome reports a Vienna message announcing the sudden outbreak of Asiatic cholera in its most violent form at Larnow, Galicia. Forty cases were reported on Tuesday.
