The death took place in the P. E. I. Hospital on Aug. 8, 1946 of Mrs. Melbourne Llewellyn at the early age of 25 years.

The remains were conveyed by Mr. Neil McLean, undertaker, to the cemetery at Murray Harbour North where on Aug. 8th, she was tenderly laid to rest. The funeral service, conducted by her pastor, Rev. Mr. Henderson was attended by a large concourse of sorrowing relatives and friends whose hearts went out to those who had been so suddenly bereaved.

Canadian Dependents Almost All Home

MONTREAL, Oct. 3.—The end of the big scale movement of Canadian servicemen's wives and children from overseas to the Dominion is in sight. An official of the office of the director of repatriation overseas personnel, Canadian Red Cross Society told a reporter here today in an interview at the C. N. R. central station where a special reception room is operated to welcome the dependents passing through Montreal.

Including the Scythia which would dock at Halifax tomorrow, there were only eight more trips to Halifax to be made by dependents' ships he said. The last scheduled to bring wives and children to Canada was the Lady Rodney, former Canadian National Steamships West Indies cruiser on November 21. He pointed out, however, there would be a number of stragglers who would be travelling after that date on regular transatlantic ships. But the definitely assigned nursery ships work would be finished by the end of November.

Mt. Alderman Charges Press With Malicious Attack

(By The Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Oct. 1.—J. O. Asselin, chairman of the City Council's executive committee declared last night that he and the City administration were the victims of "a carping and frequently malicious newspaper attack" and criticized presentation of crime news in such a way "as to suggest that Montreal is a modern Sodom and Gomorrah."

Speaking to delegates to the annual convention of the Union of Proprietors' League, Mr. Asselin said "the representatives of the French press here know I am not referring to them."

"By innuendo and thinly-veiled accusation, the executive committee is one day ridiculed as a bunch of buffoons and the next revealed as in cahoots with the underworld. I myself have been the special butt of such an attack."

The executive committee chairman said he did not object to criticism "but when criticism veers from objective and constructive observation to barbed imputations directed at one's integrity, that is a horse of a different color."
