Eddie Cantor In "Kid Millions" At Prince Edward

Eddie Cantor, banjo-eyed clown who last year cavorted among chariots and lions in the Rome of the Caesars, in "Roman Scandals," this season invades the land of the camels and the Pyramids in "Kid Millions," which comes to the Prince Edward Theatre today.

The comedian's fifth annual screen musical extravaganza for Samuel Goldwyn introduces him as a black sheep of the Brooklyn waterfront who inherits a fortune in buried treasure and travels to Egypt to claim it, with Ann Southern, Ethel Merman, George Murphy, and Block and Sully, lending romance, "hotcha," and hilarity to the proceedings.

Mr. J. I. McFarland Forced To Rest



Jimmy Cagney In "St. Louis Kid" At Capitol

James Cagney came to the Capitol Theatre today in his latest Warner Bros. picture, "The St. Louis Kid" which is said to be the most riotously funny as well as the most thrillingly dramatic production in which he has yet appeared.

The story by Frederick Hazlitt Brennan revolves about a milk trust war which Jimmy has unwittingly started by a speech conjured up to get himself out of jail for having knocked the milk magnate cold.

The milk war leads to a score of thrilling situations in which Jimmy is arrested for a murder he did not commit, his girl is kidnapped, and another war with the band of abductors. The breath-taking action, interspersed with hilarious comedy winds up in a novel and astounding climax.

Training Farms For Austral Boys

MELBOURNE, May 29—So successful have the Fairbridge Farm Schools for Boys been in Western Australia, that similar schools are now to be established in Victoria by the co-operation of the Victorian, Commonwealth and British governments.

Originally the training farm system in Australia was formed under a bequest by Lady Northcote, who had stipulated that the major portion of the income from her fortune should provide for such farms to help poor children migrate from any part of Britain to Australia and, by training, equip themselves for life.

SACKVILLE, N. B., May 30—At the annual meeting of the Regents of Mount Allison held recently in the Memorial Library, the Rev. W. C. Ross, B.A., D.D., was commissioned to make a careful study of Adult and Extension Education. Dr. Ross will continue his present position as Principal of the Ladies' College until August first, and in the meantime hopes to visit many former and prospective students in Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island.

During his year's leave of absence he will make his headquarters in Pictou, N. S., and while relaxing from the strenuous work of the office and classroom will study how Mount Allison can relate herself helpfully, through extra-mural and extension work, to the country within easy distance of Sackville.

Miss Constance Young, M.A., formerly of Kentville, N. S., has been appointed Principal of the Ladies' College, and will arrive in Sackville on August first next.

Covered Wagon To Fast Plane

SYDNEY, May 29—In 1849, aged two years, John Thoms set out with his pioneering parents from the township of Sydney, Australia, into the vast unknown plains of New South Wales. It took them six weeks in a covered bullock wagon to negotiate the passes of the barrier mountains and to reach the place where Narromine, a thriving town, stands today.

Apr 28, John Thoms, a successful contractor, has just come back to Sydney—by the first trip of a new plane service. It took him just two hours.

Chicken Halibut Is Captured

BOSTON, May 30—(C.P.)—A 10-pound chicken halibut, completely black with the exception of its white head, was landed today by the schooner Adventure of Gloucester.

Fishermen aboard the vessel reported it was caught off the Quereau Bank of Nova Scotia. Although black halibut are caught frequently, James E. Firth, marine biologist, said he had never seen this type of halibut before.

The head, Firth reported, was twisted to the left and the eyes were on the left side.

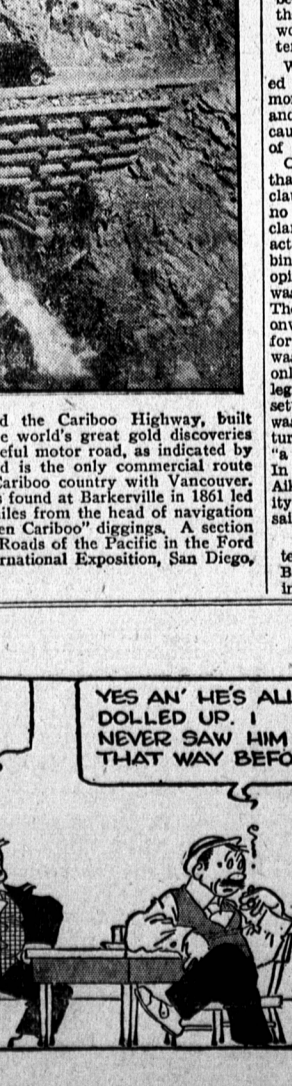
proposed that the amending Act should contain a provision that its terms were to be:

"a final and unalterable settlement of the amounts paid yearly to the several provinces of the Dominion."

Experience had shown, however, that these words "final and unalterable" in statutes were but a gesture. This was pointed out during the debate in the Dominion Parliament. Sir Wilfrid himself admitted that the words constituted "no other guarantee (of finality) but the determination of Parliament itself."

Sir Wilfrid, however, reckoned without Sir Richard McBride. McBride was then Premier of British Columbia. British Columbia had been asking for better terms than it

received at the 1907 Conference. Backed by popular sentiment in his Province McBride went to London, opposed the passing of the Act, and specifically objected to the finality clause.

The Act with the finality clause deleted was passed by the Commons, but the clause was re-inserted by the House of Lords. It was not however inserted in the body of the Act but in the Schedule only. The finality clause was passed, but being in the Schedule only, it was harmless and had no force of law. McBride returned home and scored what was then regarded as a triumph.

Writing of the transaction and of the futility of the finality clause, even if it had been left in the statute, Prof. Maxwell, of Clark University, states:

"The whole history of better terms is strewn with examples which prove that, with respect to them, explicit language in the constitution is no bar. If the 'final and unalterable' clause had been left in the Imperial statute, the agitation for better terms would have gone on without interruption."

Winston Churchill, who introduced the Bill in the House of Commons, stated that the words, "final and unalterable" were left out because they were unsuited in an Act of Parliament.

Other constitutional writers agree that the inclusion of a finality clause in an Act of Parliament has no binding effect. It is a mere declaration of the legislature which enacted it. One Parliament cannot bind a succeeding Parliament. The opinion of Sir John A. Macdonald was that the words were innocuous. The Province of Manitoba from 1878 onwards had been besieging Ottawa for better terms. In 1884 Manitoba was offered certain increases but only if they were accepted by the legislature of Manitoba as a final settlement of its claims. A statute was passed by the Manitoba legislature declaring that the terms were "a full settlement of all claims" etc. In a letter to Lieutenant-Governor Aikens on the subject of the finality clause, Sir John A. Macdonald said:

"In 1869, when Parliament granted 'better terms' to Nova Scotia, Blake moved that they should be in full of all demands, and you will find a clause to that effect in the Statutes of 1869, p. 18. Last session here British Columbia was granted better terms and Acts were passed here and in Victoria accepting them in full. I don't think Nova Scotia has suffered from the provision, and British Columbia was not a bit afraid that she would suffer."

The meaning of this is plain, and the history of the treatment of those provinces which have even placed such a finality clause in their statutes confirms Sir John A. Macdonald's view of the harmless nature of the clause referred to.

Manitoba continued to press for and to receive further concessions from the Dominion. Finality clauses whether in the statutes of the provinces or of the Dominion have neither debarred Provinces from receiving alterations in subsidy nor deterred Provincial Governments from urging that the fiscal need of the Provinces be recognized and met. Further illustrations of the successful presentation of claims based upon 'fiscal need' need not be given. I am, Sir, etc.
