#### A DESERVED HONOR

Everyone is glad that Sir Douglas Haig has received the Order of the Thistle. Among those who hold this Scottish Order are three dukes, three marquises, five earls, one viscount, Lord Haldane—five barons, and now that this honor is a high one, it may be said that there is only one other instance of a man who was not a peer having been accorded the Order of the Thistle. This was the case of the late Sir William Stirling-Maxwell of Pollock, who received the Thistle. He married as his second wife the beautiful and talented Mrs. Norton, who was born a Sheridan. A very few peers, among them the Duke of Argyll and the Lord Rosebery of today, have held both the Orders of the Garter and the Thistle, and in the old days the Garter was reckoned to take precedence of the Scottish Order, says "The Queen." So the story goes that the proud Duke of Hamilton was offered the Garter by Queen Anne, but positively refused to accept it unless at the same time he could wear his Thistle. He entreated his demand by reminding Anne that her royal brother had always worn the two Orders together. The queen acceded to his request, and from that date herself wore the two ribands together.

#### DROPPING BOMBS.

Difficult to Make Hits From Fast Moving Planes.

If a bomb is dropped from an aeroplane 10,000 feet up, and traveling at a speed of 100 miles an hour, it reaches the ground a considerable distance ahead of the point at which it was released, and the difficulty of judging how to hit a particular building must be enormous. A machine invented to assist the raiders has been found on a captured Gotha.

The main feature is a telescope hung on gimbals and pointing through the floor of the bomber's compartment. In connection with this is a form of spirit-level which brings a bubble into the centre of a glass disc when the telescope is vertical, so that the bomber knows when it is in the position that can be trusted. Below the telescope is a prism, so that the image seen is not an object directly underneath, but at any desired distance ahead, according to the angle at which it is set. For instance, if the aeroplane is 10,000 feet up and the speed is such that the bomb must be released half a mile from the object, the prism has to be set at an angle of 15 degrees. Even then the calculation is liable to error, because the density of different layers of air may vary, and, of course, any deflection of the aeroplane from the straight line to the object throws the calculation out.—Tit-Bits.

TWELVE FATALITIES IN U. S. FOOTBALL 1917. CHICAGO, Dec. 5.—Football exacted a toll of twelve victims during the 1917 season, which ended with Thanksgiving day games, according to reports to the Associated Press today. The number was six less than in 1916.

Defenders of the sport pointed out the fact that not a fatality nor even a serious injury occurred in the big universities and colleges where the game is conducted under expert physical direction. All the victims with one exception were either high school students or players, who with little or no training, participated in semi-professional games. A majority of the cases showed that the players entered the game without proper knowledge of it and without proper physical condition for so rough a sport.

The open style of play, instead of the smashing game which rapidly is being discarded, has eliminated much of the danger in the opinion of experts. The players, they say, also are better protected through improved heavily padded uniforms and head gears.




