The Markets MONTREAL, Feb. 24.—The local markets for eggs was without

any feature to note today, the feeling being about steady, under a steady increasing demand for supplies on account of the fact that the consumption is larger at the present level of prices and quite an active trade is reported in a jobbing way in Canadian new laid stock at 48c and in American new laid at 46c per dozen. The receipts of eggs today were 1,440 cases, as compared with 1,806 for the same day last week and 1,025 for the corresponding day a year ago.

There was no change in the condition of the market for dressed poultry today, prices for all lines being firmly maintained on account of the continued good demand for supplies for home consumption and for shipment to outside points and as receipts of fresh killed stock are very light, supplies in cold storage are steadily decreasing.

A steady feeling prevailed in the market for potatoes today, and prices were unchanged, there was some demand for car lots on spot.
