Some say there is not the slightest trouble and that the embargo of the Grand Trunk Railway will not affect Collingwood or the district, while others unhesitatingly declare there is a shortage that is growing more serious every day.

SUSPENSION MAY RESULT FROM PROBE SYDNEY, Feb. 7.—J. C. Lithgow, president of the M. P. H. A., speaking to The Echo last night said that some action must and would be taken immediately to put a stop to rough-house professional hockey in the Maritime Provinces.

Mr. Lithgow continued his investigation into the Sydney-Moncton game yesterday. He stated that if the Sydney management were satisfied that the penalties which had been imposed upon the players were sufficient to cover the infringements committed, such a contention would probably be taken into consideration, but at the same time it did not provide a means of stopping rough play and something must and would be done to make all players understand that dirty playing would not be tolerated in the M. P. H. A.
