FOUND BLOPING DAUGHTER AFTER LONG SEARCH

MONTREAL, April 1—After a search of nearly three years, which led him all over the United States and wiped out the savings of years, Louis Behner, of Hartford, (Conn.), yesterday discovered his daughter living in this city as the wife of a bogus navy lieutenant, with whom she eloped.

In Hartford the man posed as Lieutenant L. S. Cox, Jr., U. S. N., a well-known officer, and he left taking the girl with him when checks he had floated began to come back marked "no funds."

Here he had a cheap apartment on Victoria Street, under the name of John Shew. He was employed as a waiter at McGill University. Upon complaint of the heart-broken father of the girl, detected from the Montreal bureau arrested Shew and brought the girl, who declares she is the wife, to the police station. There was an affecting scene in the office of the chief of detectives when father and daughter met. After a long talk the girl agreed to return to Hartford and give up the man.

The bogus lieutenant on this afternoon waived extradition before Commissioner Choquet and this evening was started back to Hartford in charge of Detective William Weltner, of that city, and a local officer. He will be arraigned there on Tuesday on a charge of abduction, and possibly on an additional one of forgery. The Montreal clue to the couple which had so successfully eluded country-wide search came through an anonymous letter written to the chief of police of Hartford by an enemy of Shew's who knew his secret.

The Montreal detectives had little trouble in locating the two after Mr. Behner arrived with photographs and descriptions of them. Shew did not seem greatly troubled over his arrest. Annie Behner was only sixteen years old when the pair slipped out of Hartford, but Shew hopes to escape severe punishment for abduction in view of his declaration that they were properly married shortly after leaving Hartford. He said this afternoon that they had come from Hartford to a country place outside of Albany where they learned that Mr. Behner, who never gave up a search, had a clue to their whereabouts. They sold out hurriedly as possible and hastened to this city.

According to the story Behner told the police Shew cut a wide swath in Hartford in July, 1907, as Lieutenant Cox, after having left a trail of bad checks through New England, posing under the names of Lieutenant Arthur P. Capehart and Lieutenant A. S. Grimshaw, both reputable officers in the navy. Cox said that he had been connected with the navy for years and that he was a member of a wealthy New York family. When in the city he made his home at the Manhattan Hotel. He took a heavy insurance policy on a mythical launch and managed to pay for it with a bad check, of which he seemed to have an endless supply. Hartford society people made much of him.

When the first batch of checks came back dishonored he persuaded Hartford bankers that there had been a serious mistake in the Providence banking house in which he kept his funds and persuaded them to try the checks again. This gave him time to float more bad paper and persuade the Behner girl to elope with him.

WHEN THERMOMETERS FROZE IN MONTANA. BUTTE, Mont., March 31—"This is the record for cold weather since the winter of 1886-1887," said General Charles S. Warren the other day. "We have had thirty days of continuous cold weather, and there has scarcely been a night during that time when the thermometer did not reach the zero point. The winter of 1866 and 1867 was the only one that beats this. That is a long time to refer back to, but I am right."

"We used to have mercury thermometers those days, and it was only once in a great while when we ran across such a thing as a spirit thermometer. The mercury thermometer used to freeze solid when thirty degrees below was reached, and the bulb would break and the thermometer go out of commission. "In company with a bunch of old-

time miners I was in Silver Bow at that time. There were not more than fifty inhabitants here in Butte, and we used to think them foolish to locate on such a bleak hillside when there were much greater comforts to be gained down Silver Bow, where the town was at a lower altitude and where the wind did not have such a good sweep at us, unless it sucked through the cañyon.

"As I was saying, the mercury froze in the thermometers when it reached thirty degrees below zero, and it was only a matter of a few days until every thermometer in the camp was broken. We sent word to Deer Lodge by the stage driver to send us up a new supply, but the merchants of that town reported there was nothing doing—that the cold had broken all their thermometers as well.

"Then it was up to us to devise some means of measuring the cold. One of the miners happily found a solution of our trouble. Around all a lot of quicksilver there is always a lot of sludge boxes to catch the placer gold. Mercury was our standard of cold measure in all the thermometers, so this chap used to put a lot of quicksilver into a gold pan and place it at some point outside his cabin from thirty to sixty minutes. That

"Actually, it was so cold that the 'quick' would freeze so hard within an hour that we could carry it into the cabin and batter it about like a piece of lead until it began warming up, then it would return to its original elusive form.

"The cold registering device was simple, if you only knew how to go about it, and I honestly believe the miners in that placer camp at Silver Bow during that never to be forgotten March recorded the weather accurately.
