Mr. Spencer of St. Peter's Road and Rev. T. F. Fullerton, Charlottetown. The pallbearers were Thomas Stinson, James Wyatt, William Bishop, William Cairns, T. Chappelle and William Thompson.

The City of London had 60 passengers, 35 cases eggs, and 1 ox from Fort Augustus yesterday forenoon. In the evening she brought down 80 cases eggs, etc., and a number of fishermen who had spent the day at Hayden's.

At the Police Court yesterday Prohibition cases against Francis Collins, Daniel McMillan, Elizabeth McMillan, James Haynes, Wm. McGaun and Augustus Elsworth were dismissed. Margaret Jimmeseau was given one month for vagrancy.

Among the graduates at the Union Commercial College is John C. Connick son of John Connick of Kensington, who has completed his course and has been awarded the diploma of the institution. Mr. Connick entered College in January, and since that time has proved himself a very efficient worker. Painsstaking and industrious, he has accomplished good results, and is to be congratulated on graduating in such a short time.

The dwelling of Peter Realy of Tinian caught fire about 10 o'clock Thursday night and considerable damage was done to the kitchen while the main part of the building suffered but little, the blaze being kept from spreading through the hard efforts of the neighbors. It is not known how the fire originated. Mr. Realy has just recently returned from Sydney, to which place he removed with his family some time ago, and was occupying the dwelling alone.

Rev. J. C. Shearer spoke at Mount Stewart on Thursday evening and at Montague last evening. He will preach at Bedeque Sunday morning at Kensington in the evening. On Monday evening he will be in Alberton, on Tuesday in Bethel Methodist Church in Maddock Lot 8, and on Wednesday evening in Souris. Rev. T. The death occurred of Mrs. John Howatt at the residence of her son, Horace Howatt, Bedeque on Thursday last. Her demise came as a shock to her many friends. She was a sister of Mrs. Farquharson, Southport; Mrs. Thomas Frizel, Summerside; Berj. Rogers, City; and David Rogers, Freetown. Besides her sisters and brothers, there are left to mourn a husband, one daughter, Mrs. (Rev.) A. C. Bell, Welsford, N.B., and two sons, Dr. Fred Howatt, Hammond, Indiana; and Horace, Bedeque. Mrs. Howatt was a member of the Methodist Church and much loved and respected by all who knew her. The family in their irreparable loss have the sympathy of a large circle of friends.

YESTERDAY afternoon at four o'clock, the death occurred at Fort Augustus, of James Wilfrid Cummiskey, 18 years of age and eldest son of Hon. J. H. Cummiskey, Acting Premier and Commissioner of Public Works. Deceased had been ill for some time from spinal trouble, as a result of injuries received by a fall at about eight years ago from a house on hard pavement near his father's residence, Webster's Corner, Fort Augustus. He was always a general favorite with old and young owing to his kind, intelligent disposition and never any burden to his parents. He took his bed some two months ago and during his sickness had the pleasure of almost daily visits from his spiritual director, Rev. A. J. McDonald, P. P., Fort Augustus. He exhibited wonderful vitality by taking practically no nourishment for 38 days before his demise, and talked to his mother and sisters quite consciously fifteen minutes before death, believing in a greater future. "Blessed are they that die in the Lord, for theirs is the kingdom of Heaven."
