**KINEMACOLOR PICTURES AT THE EDEN MUSEE.**

The most wonderful moving picture machine in the world is at the Eden Musee of New York City, and has attracted the general attention of scientists and persons interested in motion pictures. It is called the Kinemacolor Picture Machine, and reproduces upon a large screen, moving pictures in their original colors. Different people have tried to figure out the number of different colors in the picture shown, but have finally come to the conclusion that the wonderful machine produces all the varying shades of the different colors that can be produced. The new process is wonderfully simple and entirely different from anything previously shown in colored photography. The film has no colors in it, but the effect is produced by the light passing through various colored screens, which form the combinations of color in nature. Among the pictures shown each afternoon and evening at the Musee, are, "The Zoological Gardens of London," "The London Fire Brigade," "The Canals of Venice," "Bathing Scenes at Pompeii" and "The Last Days of Pompeii," England." Every detail of color is brought out so perfectly, that it is hard for the visitor to realize that the original subject is not being actually seen. Other pictures in black and white are shown in conjunction with the colored pictures each hour after afternoon and evening. A special holiday attraction in the Winter Garden, is Hews, the wonderful magician, who has earned the name of "The King of Magic." His feats of magic and illusions are extremely clever, and of choice music adds much to the attractiveness of the Musee. The wax collection is now the most complete in the world.

**GRAIN LETTER.**

**CHICAGO, Jan. 4**—Wheat has been dull today, trade very small in comparison with yesterday. Cables disappointing. Live stock market lower in the face of sharp advance yesterday. However, continental markets generally higher, weather moderate in winter wheat belt but forecast is for colder weather.

Corn has been easier on general basis in the Argentine Corn belt also lack of Eastern shipping demand. Local longs taking profit, however, on all declines, good commission buying developed.

Oats—Dull and featureless, following other grains.

Provisions have sold off under pressure from Milwaukee Packers and larger longs selling through private wire houses.

**CLOSING COTTON LETTER.**

(From F. B. McCurdy & Co's Private Wire.)

**NEW YORK, Jan. 4**—We have had a nervous and unsettled market today. The people who took up positions on January have shown no disposition to add to their contract holdings and in the absence of bull support the market has worked lower under selling by local professionals and scattering liquidation. There has been nothing to create bearish sentiment beyond the rumors of heavy selling returns up to January first but the market recently has not responded to the bullish features of the willingness of the south to sell around the fifteen cent level. It has no doubt been a disappointment to some of the old longs and with talk of big ginning, scattering long interest which had been carried over into the holidays were evidently being liquidated during today's trading. Local professionals who are always more or less inclined to the bear side started selling as soon as they saw long cotton coming on an unsupported market as a result May broke to 15 cents. Liverpool futures were a little lower than due but spot markets there made a steady showing and private wires continue to report good demand from Lancashire. Aside from the unsatisfactory reports of Domestic dry-goods conditions and the talk of a heavy ginning, the news has seemed rather than against prices. It may be partly due to unfavorable weather but interior receipts are certainly falling off while all indications point to continued heavy exports, private advices indicate firm interior spot markets and such a large proportion of this crop has already been marketed that it may at any time inaugurate a holding movement.

**CLOSING STOCK LETTER.**

(From F. B. McCurdy & Co's Private Wire.)

**NEW YORK, Jan. 4**—Randolph says: "The opening was strong and active and during the morning trading the entire list advanced with a good deal of uniformity in spite of the fact that the market had to take account of the inter-state Commerce Commission handing down a decision favorable to the railroads on the question of rate, some time this month. The afternoon market hesitated and became somewhat reactionary stock being supplied on the advances quite freely although as the market reacted the pressure was removed and trading grew very dull. The net result of the day was trifling, stocks showing as a rule very slight changes. Compared with the high prices of the morning however, the leading issues declined on an average about a point. Traders pointed to the fact that the tendency of the market to grow dull on the decline which loans freely at 4 1/2 per cent showing that as yet there is some scarcity of funds in the street. This produced but little effect on trading however as it is believed that money will be very plentiful within a few days.
