## The SNAPSHOT GUILD SELF-TIMERS



You can take a picture of the family picnic and be in it yourself by using a self timer.

THE question is often asked, "Is there any way that I can take a snapshot of my friends and include myself in the picture?" There certainly is a way and a simple one. Use a self timer.

A self timer is a most fascinating little gadget and almost human in its operation. It is an inexpensive accessory that fits over the metal button, or plunger, at the end of the cable release, which you press to take a snapshot with a folding camera. It cannot, however, be used unless the camera is fitted with a cable release.

Here is how it works. First you locate your subject in the finder and at the same time plan the space you will occupy when you step into the picture.

Suppose you want to take a picture of a group on a picnic or at the beach. You will have to have the camera on a tripod, table or something solid. Locate the group in the finder—and be sure you can see the spot you will occupy or you may be among those missing when the prints are returned.

When the lens aperture is set at the proper opening with the correct shutter speed, the same as if you were going to snap the picture yourself, set the self timer for the length of time it would take you to get to your place in the group. Slip the self timer over the button at the end of the cable release and press the little release lever on the timer. It starts buzzing away, you rejoin the group and then—click—it has taken the picture and you're in it.

You can purchase a self timer attachment from almost any store that sells photographic supplies. They are not expensive and last a lifetime.

Some cameras have self timers incorporated in the shutter construction, so if you have this type of camera and have never used the self timer you have missed a lot of fun and picture taking opportunities.

## Stop Soil Drift Store Fertility

NOTTINGHAM, England, Oct. 3—(CP)—Measures for fighting soil erosion and the gravity of the situation of agriculture in various parts of the Empire were discussed by Sir John Russell and other experts at a sectional meeting of the British Association for the Advancement of Science.

Sir John's general discussion of how to create a satisfactory grass pasture led up to the statement that laying land down to grass would increase the fertility of the soil.

After speaking of extreme erosion in Africa and Asia, Sir John said, "one of the most important problems, then, in our own sub-tropical and tropical areas is to find some way of covering land with rapidly-growing vegetation so as to stop erosion."

Dr. Winnifred Brencley, speaking of the ultimate composition of the herbage from various seed mixtures, described an experiment in laying down to grass a loam on clay with a number of mixtures sown in parallel strips.

Rough-staked meadow grass was slow in establishing itself, but spread considerably and had invaded areas in which it was not sown.

Hamilton Tigers and Toronto Argos of the big four were idle, but Hamilton Club of the Ontario Union dropped a 15-4 decision to Dundas of the Intermediate Ontario League.

## Depth Charges For Scientific Research

(By The Canadian Press) WOODS HOLE, Mass., Oct. 3—The study ship Atlantis is discharging depth bombs in the Gulf Stream but it is a mission of peaceful scientific research not war.

"Our object is to determine and study carefully the thickness of unconsolidated sediment on the ocean floor," explained Dr. Maurice L. Ewing, leader of the expedition sponsored by the Geographical Society of America.

"I hope to discover just how far down the sediment extends and the hard pan rock of the earth's crust begins."

Aboard the Atlantis were placed 12 boxes of TNT, "Geophones and seismographs are our principal instruments," the scientist continued.

## Finances Only Obstacle To Renewal Of Schooner Races

LUNenburg, N. S., Oct. 3—(CP)—Only obstacle to be surmounted before international fishing schooner racing was resumed appeared tonight to be financial backing of this project.

Doughty Angus Walters, Captain of the famed Lunenburg fisherman Bluenose, brought his vessel back from the banks to hear a challenge from his American rival, Captain Ben Pine of the Gloucesterman Gertrude L. Thebaud, and answered that he "certainly would like to race again against the Gertrude Thebaud."

Both skippers introduced the financial side of the matter. The Gloucester skipper suggested the series of races be staged as a feature of the World Fair at New York and added that approximately \$50,000 would be necessary to compensate the owners.

"It's a long way to look to," commented Captain Walters. "I wish we could get something definite on it, so we could make our plans."

Both vessels would have to be overhauled before they would be in condition to race and auxiliary engines installed for banks fishing would have to be taken out.

As Captain Walters expressed it "You can't race for the love of it any more."

Undeclared in international schooner racing since she entered the fray 15 years ago, the Bluenose lost her topmast and has had an engine installed.

But her skipper said if the race were made attractive to both owners and "if they would make a definite offer, we certainly would consider it."

The speedy son of Pharamond 2nd and Chabades thundered down the Widener straightaway course Saturday to hit the wire four lengths in the van of 12 crack youngsters; earn \$68,825 for Headley and establish a new world record of 1:15 4-5 for 6 1-2 furlongs.

Tiger, championship aspirant owned by the Milky Way Farm of Mrs. Ethel V. Mars, barely earned the place in a photo finish with William Woodward's Fighting Fox.

With the money won Saturday, Menow replaced Tiger as the leading money winner juvenile of the year with earnings of \$65,825.

## Porters Learn New Method of Making up Berths
