THE PROJECTED RAILWAY.

Many things are claimed for the projected transcontinental railway, and notably these, that it will shorten the railway distance between the two oceans, shorten the routes between Canada, and China and Japan, shorten the route around the world, and also will give so much easier grades than our existing railways have that it will greatly reduce the cost of transportation. The distance from Quebec to Port Simpson on the Pacific will be 2,925 miles and from Port Simpson to Yokohama, Japan, by steamship 3,800 miles, making a total of 6,725 miles, whereas the mileage by the C. P. R., route from Quebec is 7,413 miles, a saving of 688 miles. From Liverpool via Halifax and the new route to Yokohama will be 10,085 miles, and by the C. P. R., route it is not 10,445 miles, the saving being 410 miles. From Liverpool by steamer direct to Quebec, thence by the new route to Port Simpson and on to Yokohama will be 9,417 miles, or 280 miles shorter than the eastern route via the Russian Siberian Railway.

And then, its advocates point to the matter of grades. The mountain climbing which is met with in all other transcontinental railways costs heavily for the extra power required. The lowest elevation at which any of the present American or Canadian Pacific railways cross the Rocky Mountains is found on the Great Northern Railway, at an elevation of 5,202 feet above the water. That is a perpendicular elevation of nearly a mile. The Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, it is claimed, will be able to get through the mountains by either the Pine River or the Peace River Pass at an elevation not exceeding 2,400 feet above the sea level. The maximum grade on the Great Northern Railway which is the lowest of any of the cross-continent roads, is 116 feet to the mile. On the proposed Grand Trunk Pacific the steepest grades in the mountain section will be 91 feet to the mile. Outside of the mountain section it is claimed there will be no grade steeper than 26 feet to the mile and these only for short distances. With these easy grades and shortened distances and with heavy rails, modern bridges and an exceptionally straight line, all favorable to speed, economy and security in transportation, it is hoped to make the new road a model among the railways of the earth.

The Montreal Herald tells that it is the

intention of the Grand Trunk people to proceed most energetically with their portion of the work of construction. The company have now sixty surveying parties on the line, and when construction begins it will be attached with an enormous force beginning at about fifteen points simultaneously. The intention is to press it to completion if possible within three years. The company will equip the entire line with rolling stock and estimate that this, with the terminals will cost twenty-five millions of dollars. The estimate of the Toronto Globe as to the cost of the entire work is about \$125,000,000 of which 45 millions will be the cost of the Government portion of the roadway, Moncton to Winnipeg, 55 millions for the Company's share of the roadway thence to the Pacific coast and the balance for rolling stock and terminals as above.

COMMERCIAL TRAVELER DROWNED.

WALBOBORO, Me. July 5.—Frank A. Archer, of Cherryfield, Me., a travelling salesman for Brown Durrell Company of Boston, was drowned yesterday at Friedship by being knocked over board by the boom of a catboat. He was single and 26 years old.

FATAL FALL FROM A STREET CAR.

FALL RIVER, July 4.—Wright W. Dobson of this city, was almost instantly killed here today by falling from a moving electric car. Dobson had just boarded the car and was passing to a seat when he fell backward and struck the pavement, dying within a few moments.

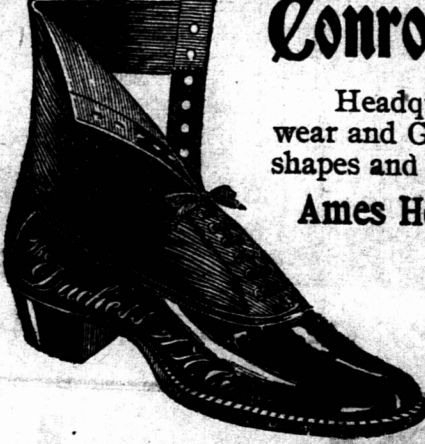
