Truro Defeats Moncton 6-5

TRURO, N. S., Jan. 29.—Truro Bears topped the league-pacing Moncton Hawks 6-5 tonight to move into a second-place deadlock with Saint John Beavers in the Maritime Big Four hockey league. Both Truro and Saint John now are just two points off Moncton and six marks ahead of the last-place Halifax Crescents.

With less than three minutes to go Alex Robertson took rays from Bud McEachern and Bert Steele to pump in the winning goal after the lead had changed hands four times during the hectic tussle. Only three penalties were awarded—two to Moncton and one to Truro.

The teams squared away at 2:23 at the end of the first period. Bears moved in front by a single tally, 4-3, at the end of the middle period and in the last lap traded Hawks goal for goal.

Chick Charbon Dowling shot Moncton ahead only two minutes after the game started but McEachern got that one back and Lou Medynski lodged Bears on the lead at the end of the third period.

Mike Demchuk evened the count of goals before the period ended and Bucko Trainer moved in the second. Billy McIntyre replied and late in the session Truro took over again when Don Barkwell tallied after a solo dash. Galloping Mahar brought Hawks back on the Truro level at 4-4 at the start of the third, only to have Medynski pick off his second goal. Dowling and McManus combined to make it five apiece and it wasn't until the clock hand had made almost a complete circuit that Robertson shot the winner.

Bruins Defeat Red Wings 4-1

BOSTON, Jan. 29.—(AP)—Boston Bruins lengthened their third place National Hockey League margin over the hard-pushing but idle New York Rangers by outskating Detroit Red Wings for a 4-1 win tonight before a packed 13,900 crowd at the Boston Garden. Little Kenney Smith gave the victors their last two goals in the third period.

The Red Wings saved themselves from a shutout when defenseman Bill Quackenbush caged Roy Conacher's forward pass early in the opener while the Bruins had a player in the penalty box.

That successful climax to a five-man rush came about a minute after rookie Mark Marquest had scratched the first Boston goal by whacking in the rebound on Jack Crawford's 50-foot slinger.

McGill converted when Fern Flaman lashed a 40-footer against goalie Harry Lumley's pads in the second frame, just before Bep Guidolin and Detroit's Pete Hekrek drew major penalties for fighting.

The tiny Smith, generally used for defensive purposes, assured the Bruins second win here over the Red Wings in four nights. He whacked in a Moe Henderson rebound before fooling Lumley with a high 15-foot angle shot which was set up by pivotman Don Gallinger.

Those sextets now move to Detroit for a Saturday night game, with the Bruins topping Rangers by three points.

Former Great In Baseball Dies

ELKINS, W. Va., Jan. 29.—(AP)—Del C. Gainer, 60, deputy United States marshal for northern West Virginia and first baseman of the world champion Boston Red Sox of 1915 and 1916, died of a heart attack today.

Gainer broke into baseball in 1909 with the Grafton, W. Va. club of the old West Virginia-Pennsylvania League. After a year with Fort Wayne, Ind., in the Central League, he went up to the parent Detroit Tigers and played there in 1911 along with Ty Cobb.

Detroit sold him to Boston in 1915 and he rejoined the Red Sox after war service in the Navy. He later played with St. Louis Cardinals and bowed out of baseball in the late 20's as manager of the Fairmont, W. Va., club of the Middle-Atlantic League.

MONTREAL, Jan. 29.—Montreal Canadiens have reached into the Maritime and put on their negotiation list two promising youngsters, but how they got there—snatched from the clutches of Toronto Maple Leafs—is something else.

The boys, now playing with Halifax St. Mary's, are Bert Hersfield, a centre, and Dugger McNeil, a defenceman.

"I had a tip from Toronto that Squib Walker, Leaf scout was on his way to Halifax," said general manager Frank Selke of Canadiens today, with a sly grin. "I had a pretty good idea what players he was after, especially since Gordie Drillon has been doing some scouting down that way for his old club. So I took two players off our negotiation list, quickly got those St. Mary's boys on his way to Halifax, and the Leafs are in for a surprise."

Growing a little more expansive over his coup, Selke went on:—"We figure on leaving those boys there until they graduate from school. It has never been my policy to take players from junior clubs just because they are promising, but rather to let them race over with their clubs. Of course, we are always scouting new talent and by doing this we hope some day to make Canadian representative of every province in the Dominion."

Record For 880 Yards Close To Being Beaten

WELLINGTON, N.Z., Jan. 29.—(Reuters)—Sydney Wooderson's 1938 world record of 1:49.2 for 880 yards came close to being beaten today when Douglas Harris, New Zealand record holder, clocked 1:49.4 in beating the visiting American athlete, John Fulton, at Wanganui.

Harris, who ran what is described as one of the greatest half-mile races ever seen in the southern hemisphere, is considered a distinct prospect for the 1948 Olympic games. His time was all the more impressive in view of the fact that the Wanganui grass track was later found to be two feet longer than 880 yards.

French Fans Sour Slam Fight Delay

LONDON, Jan. 27.—(REUTERS)—A controversy has developed over the proposed bout between Vince Hawkins and Marcel Cerdan to decide the European middleweight titleholder.

Cerdan, who won favor in U.S. boxing circles when he outpointed George Abrams in New York last month, was matched some time ago with Hawkins, but a disagreement about where the fight was to be staged caused a stalemate in negotiations.

Hawkins wanted the fight in London and the French boxing federation fixed it for Paris. French fans view the delay sourly as they are confident that Cerdan can beat the British champion.

Cerdan, who served in the French navy during war, undoubtedly is the best in his class that post-war Europe has to offer. In France he is regarded as a national hero. Paris fans are convinced that he will be the next world's middleweight champion.

But other observers recall that hard-fisted Rocky Graziano and Tony Zale stand in his way if he is able to overcome the obstacle of British fans.

While the date of the fight between the French and British fighters remains to be settled, British fans are looking forward to the Jan. 26 bout between Britain's featherweight Neil Tarleton and Willie Pep of the United States, for the world's featherweight title.

Chancellor of the Exchequer, Hugh Dalton and his watchdogs over the treasury have framed a schedule for taxing bets, but by the time the plan is put into operation, experts believe they will have missed their golden chance to grab part of the money bet during the last three years when a record-smashing gambling spree swept Britain.

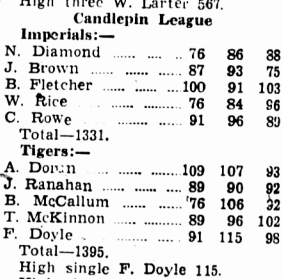
Even though the treasury will miss many millions of dollars that might have swelled the national purse, betting circles believe that Dalton and his advisers will get what pickings they can from now on.

This belief has given rise to a fear among turf authorities that tax levied on bets ultimately will kill racing in Britain and thereby lead to the gradual extinction of one of Britain's leading industries—breeding of race horses.
