**Review P. E. I. Protestant Orphanage**  
Owing to the multitude of activities due to the war our Orphanage has not given any publicity to its essential Child Welfare Work brought about largely from existing conditions. The regular meeting of the Trustees was held in the institution on Tuesday last, an excellent luncheon was served and the problems which are numerous, were fully dealt with.

It was found necessary to have the large roof shingled at a cost approaching one thousand dollars. All committee reports were encouraging; Mrs. H. S. Henderson for the Finance Committee reported Coun-

try Organization for the fall collection well underway. It was agreed that the collection in the City would open on Tuesday, October 12th. She also reported some amounts received recently including Bethel O. I. \$6.45. In Memory of the late Neil McCannell \$10.00; Queen County Orange Lodge \$27.33; The Enna Celtic Club \$68.07 and the Endowment Fund \$75.00 from Estie Miss Katherine MacQuarrie.

The Adoption Committee outlined many of their problems and showed that the work was rapidly increasing and that, in consequence we might expect shortly to pass the sixty mark for children in our care.

Our Coal order had been placed quite early but had not yet arrived; one car was expected daily. This is annually our largest single bill and this year may well exceed \$1,000.00.

However the trustees in looking over the institution found everything in such apple-pie order that they were greatly cheered; crops looked well and vegetables were being used in considerable quantities and the children, they certainly appeared healthy and happy as they romped about with their games in the open.

It was with a new determination inspired by the sight of so many children being benefited that the members returned to their several homes, satisfied that where such needed protection, care and training can be given, the money to carry it through will not be withheld.

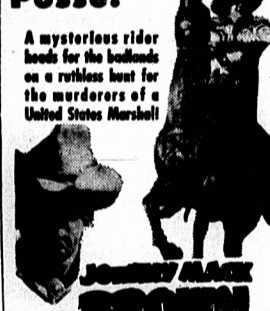
