THE PROHIBITORY LAW.

A Prohibitory Law that prohibits largely—such as we have and have had for years—must necessarily entail inconvenience upon a number of persons. It is inconvenient to the habitual rumrunner who is determined to sell, law or no law, for the gain he can make.

It is inconvenient for the doctor or the druggist who would like to oblige a genteel and well-paying patient or customer whose health depends, in his own imagination, on certain stimulants that he wants.

It is inconvenient for any of those to pay fines and to take the final alternative of going to prison for a third offence.

It is sometimes inconvenient to the magistrate to convict a dealer with whom he may have sustained very friendly business and social relations.

It is inconvenient for the politician who finds the illicit liquor sellers a valuable canvasser and assistant at election times with a certain class of electors whose minds are cleared of doubts and whose party convictions are stirred by an ardent stimulant at such times.

It is inconvenient for the Government, too, when prominent and active supporters ask their intervention to have a fifth offence made a first offence, or that Governmental influence shall be brought to bear on a Prosecutor to induce him to "go slow," or upon a Magistrate to not enforce a conviction, or upon a Governor to exercise executive clemency, or upon a Jail Physician to certify to the reality of a purely imaginary illness.

We know all about these inconveniences. We could cite instances and quote names. We forbear for the present.

These inconveniences must be faced, squarely and manfully. The Prohibitory Law will not enforce itself, any more than would the Scott Act.

It has been reasonably well enforced. It has done great good. A determined effort is now being made to break down the law in certain quarters.

The friends of the law should rally with determined resolution and if they do so they can readily command and control the situation.

The Guardian has been busy with another grave question of late, but we have not forgotten the Prohibitory Law, nor the great moral need of standing by it. It will receive full attention hereafter.

WHAT WILL THEY DO?

For some weeks past The Guardian has in a series of articles, which have been widely read and commented upon, dealt with the matter of our relations with Canada under the broken terms of union.

The discussion is now being taken up in some leading papers of the Mainland and a public meeting at Kensington on Friday evening next will further deal with it.

Our personal correspondence received on the subject extends to all parts of the Island and from Newfoundland to Calgary.

The Legislature must shortly meet. The one engrossing question in many minds is what will the Provincial Government and the Provincial Legislature do to assert our rights?

What will the Ottawa Government do to carry out in good faith the union terms hitherto broken?

We are to have a Marconi Station at Pictou it is said, but when? The new steamer promised years ago, is not yet in sight or contracted for. In the event of the Marconi system being made available before spring, what will the rates be? This question also is vital.

The Pair ot:—"This season the winter service has been eminently satisfactory. Think of it Without any telegraph service at all, with doubled freight rates via Georgetown, and doubled passenger rates. This is "eminently satisfactory" to the editor of The Patriot, but not to the people.

We print today further correspondence from the St. John Sun bearing on the Island's relations with Canada. The late arrival of the mail prevented publication of the entire letter. It forms a valuable contribution to the literature of the subject, from the viewpoint of a Government supporter, but our readers will find that the correspondent's letters are unjust to The Guardian in several respects.

EDITOR'S MAIL.

LETTER FROM CORONER ARSENAULT.

Sir:—You publish a letter in your issue of this morning over the signature of Alexander Ross of Alberton, which is a veiled attack on me as a Coroner for Prince County. The implication is that the Government appoints men to office who are unfit for the position. If I am not an honest man I have had to wait in this community where I was born, forty-five years ago to find it out. I have the honor to be the first Academic Coroner appointed in the Province. Faults were found with my predecessors but no man ever had temerity enough to accuse them of dishonesty in the administration of their duties in a most responsible position. I never took part in any newspaper controversy and although through no fault of mine I was harassed some years before Dr. Ross was hatched in my relation of life in this community, no man ever said I did not do justice according to my lights. Dr. Ross may think he is safe in attacking me. Parties to this investigation made formal statements in the press over their signatures of which Dr. Ross took no notice, evidently for reasons of his own. No man should be dishonorably attacked. I will send at Dr. Ross' request, the signed evidence to the President of the Maritime Medical Association and let him be judged by his peers. I want to be charitable; but I don't think their verdict would inure to my disadvantage.

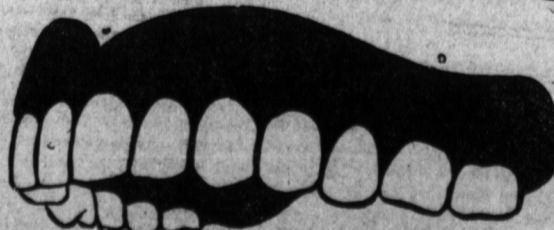
