PREMIER HASZARD'S MANIFESTO.

Premier Haszard has issued a manifesto to the electors of Prince Edward Island containing ten propositions. These are in brief: (1) to press for the settlement of our claims at Ottawa, including the Fishery Award; (2) to consolidate the provincial debt; (3) to disseminate information of advantage to farmers and to have the federal Government establish a farm for illustration purposes; (4) to improve the educational system by giving more prominence to the teaching of agriculture and to reduce the cost of school-books; (5) to assist the extension of the telephone system; (6) continue the construction of permanent public works; (7) to urge upon the federal Government an immediate survey of Northumberland Straits to ascertain whether the construction of a Tunnel is reasonably practicable and if so to urge that the construction be undertaken; (8) to have our fishery rights defined and settled; (9) to have the Province placed on an equitable basis with the rest of Canada in regard to transportation rates; (10) to urge the federal Government to secure such amendment of the B.N.A. Act as will restore to the Province its original representation in the House of Commons.

THE PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION.

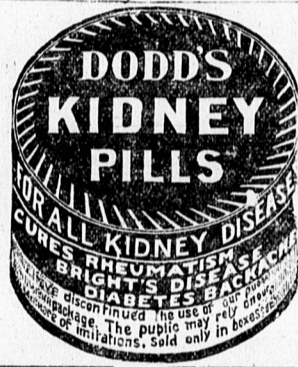
Yesterday was voting day in the presidential election in the United States, the result of which is not known at the time of this writing, although the opinion is widely prevalent that the Republican party will be again victorious. The campaign has been remarkable for the great activity of the candidates who have for months past been continually rushing from place to place and speaking several times each day and night. Mr. Bryan on his recent flying visit to New York addressed twenty different meetings in the day and evening. The campaign has thus applied a severe test of physical endurance to the two candidates both of whom are evidently very vigorous men.

The presidential elections occur at fixed periods of four years, on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November. The people do not vote directly for the President and Vice President, but in each state they vote for a number of Electors, or delegates, who afterward give their votes for the candidates of their choice. Some of the smaller states are allotted but three or four electors while the larger states have more because of their larger population. Thus New York is allotted 39, Pennsylvania 34, Illinois 27 and so on. The

electors chosen for a state, afterward meet within their state and vote by ballot for President and Vice President and make return of the result to the President of the Senate at Washington. This is to be done on the second Monday in January next. The votes will be counted in the presence of the Houses of Congress on the second Wednesday in February next.

The last Democratic President was Grover Cleveland 1892-6. President McKinley, Republican, was elected in 1896, the change taking place practically at the same time as the change of parties in Canada. Since that date Republican majorities have continued to grow. Mr. McKinley's popular plurality over Mr. Bryan in 1896 was 601,854. Mr. Roosevelt's plurality over Mr. Parker in 1904 was 2,545,515. It would be a marvel if Mr. Bryan who had been twice defeated in the national contest could now overcome this large and hitherto increasing majority. So the popular impression in Canada has all along been that Republican chances of victory in the States were about as good as Liberal chances in our own national elections just past, which proved to be very good indeed. Beyond this the Canadian people are chiefly interested in the high character, the distinguished abilities and the friendliness toward both Britain and Canada which mark the two great men between whom the American people made their choice yesterday.

The late election in Charlottetown was orderly and quiet beyond precedent, thanks to prohibition and the Reform League. In Winnipeg, under a license law it was different. "As soon as the polls closed," says the Winnipeg Free Press, "many of the hotel bars were thrown open and until long after midnight they were thronged with howling mobs. . . . Probably never before in any city of Canada have so many drunken men been seen on the streets in the same length of time." Which is the better way?

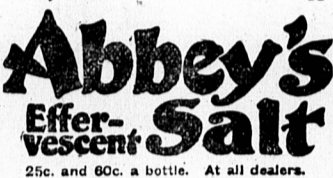

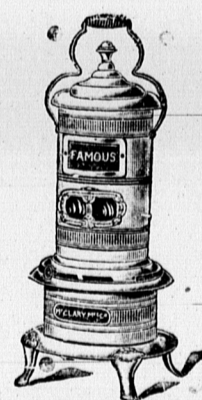
