SCHOOL REOPENS.—The Earncliffe school re-opened last week after being closed two months on account of an epidemic of measles in that district.

HUNTER RIVER.—Mr. George F. Bears, formerly in the employ of Bruce Stewart & Co., Charlottetown, has opened a blacksmith shop in this village. His many friends both in City and country will wish him success in his undertaking.

REPAIRS.—Messrs Bruce Stewart and Company are doing some repairs to the salt steamer Glenbridge now lying at Pownal wharf. The Glenbridge was damaged by ice while on her way to Charlottetown. The firm are also putting an intermediate shaft into the tug "Fred M. Batt."

THE ROADS.—The roads in the vicinity of the city are rapidly drying up and there should be good driving very shortly. There is, however, a large quantity of snow in the western part of the Island and it will be some weeks before the roads in that section become fit for travelling over.

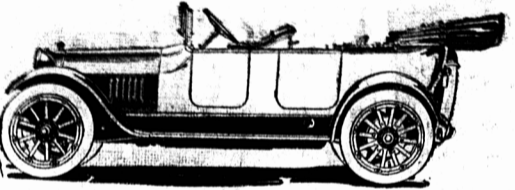
